## 1955 World Champions

For the Brooklyn Dodgers, the 1955 World Series was not just a chance to win a championship, but an opportunity to avenge five previous World Series failures at the hands of their chief rivals, the New York Yankees.

Even with their ace Don Newcombe on the mound, the Dodgers seemed to be doomed from the start, as three Yankee home runs set back Newcombe and the rest of the team in their opening 6-5 loss. Game 2 had the same result, as New York's southpaw Tommy Byrne held Brooklyn to five hits in a 4-2 victory.

With the Series heading back to Brooklyn, Johnny Podres was given the start for Game 3. The Dodger lefty stymied the Yankees' offense over the first seven innings by allowing one run on four hits en route to an 8-3 victory. Podres gave the Dodger faithful a hint as to what lay ahead in the series with his complete-game, six-strikeout performance.

Game 4 at Ebbets Field turned out to be an all-out slugfest. After falling behind early, 3-1, the Dodgers used the long ball to knot up the series. Future Hall of Famers Roy Campanella and Duke Snider each homered and Gil Hodges collected three of the club's 14 hits, including a home run in the 8-5 triumph.

Snider's third and fourth home runs of the Series provided the support needed for rookie Roger Craig and the Dodgers took Game 5 by a score of 5-3. However, a Yankee five-run first inning in Game 6 was all Whitey Ford needed to win 5-1 and send the Fall Classic to a decisive Game 7. Podres and Byrne matched up in the finale, both coming off of complete-game victories. An RBI single and a sacrifice fly from Hodges was all the offense Podres required to capture Brooklyn's first and only World Championship, as he would throw his second complete game of the series and win in a 2-0 shutout on his way to garnering MVP honors.

## 1959 World Champions

After advancing to the World Series in only their second season in Los Angeles, the Dodgers' opportunity to seize their first West Coast championship came against the Chicago White Sox.

In Game 1, Chicago showed its dominance on the mound as veteran and future Hall of Famer Early Wynn held the Dodgers scoreless over seven innings en route to an 11-0 victory. Game 2 at Comiskey Park started like the first, with Johnny Podres falling behind Bob Shaw 2-0. With the Dodgers behind 2-1 in the 7th inning Chuck Essegian, who had only homered once all year, pinch-hit for Podres and hit a two-out blast to knot the game at 2-2. Two batters later Charlie Neal hit his second home run of the day and the Dodgers never looked back as Larry Sherry went the final three innings to pick up the save in the 4-3 Dodger victory.

In front of all-time record crowds of over 92,000 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, the Dodgers were able to capture Games 3 and 4 by scores of 3-1 and 5-4 respectively, due to a clutch two-run pinch-hit single by Carl Furillo in Game 3, and a tie-breaking home run in the 8th inning of Game 4 by Gil Hodges. Larry Sherry proved to be the hero on the mound, as he pitched two innings in each game, picking up the save in Game 3 and the win in Game 4.

Game 5 proved to be a classic pitcher's duel as Bob Shaw outlasted Sandy Koufax in the White Sox' 1-0 victory. The game's lone run on a Sherm Lollar double-play ground out. Game 6 back in Chicago was all Dodgers, as Duke Snider, Charlie Neal, and Wally Moon combined for six hits, two home runs, and six RBI.

## 1963 World Champions

Like so many Dodger teams of the 1960s, this 1963 edition was known for stellar pitching, and the arms of Sandy Koufax, Don Drysdale, Johnny Podres and Ron Perranoski didn't disappoint during the Fall Classic. These four pitchers were the only ones to throw a pitch for Los Angeles in the World Series in 1963, combining to post a 1.00 ERA (4 ER/36.0 IP) and humble the Yankees in a four-game sweep.

In Game 1, Koufax out-dueled Yankee ace Whitey Ford in the Dodgers' 5-2 win. Koufax went the distance and fanned 15 Yankee batters, setting a new World Series record. Batterymate John Roseboro delivered the big blow of the game with a three-run home run in the second inning.

Game 2 was a carbon copy of the first, as Johnny Podres silenced the Yankee Stadium crowd by allowing just one run over 8.1 innings. Willie Davis doubled in two runs in the first off of future Dodger Al Downing to provide all the runs Podres would need.

Dodger Stadium hosted its first World Series game in Game 3 as 19-game winner Don Drysdale opposed 21-game winner Jim Bouton. Drysdale would outlast Bouton in one of the finest pitcher's duels in World Series history as he would toss a complete-game, three-hit shutout. Bouton threw seven innings of four-hit ball, but Tommy Davis' RBI single put the Dodgers in control of the series with the 1-0 victory.

The finale witnessed yet another fantastic pitcher's duel between Game 1 starters Koufax and Ford. Frank Howard's two hits were all the Dodgers would get that afternoon and gave Koufax a lead with a solo home run in the fifth. A Mickey Mantle home run tied the game in the seventh, but the Dodgers would take the lead in the bottom of the inning when Willie Davis knocked in Jim Gilliam with a sacrifice fly. Series MVP Koufax would once again go the distance while striking out eight Yankees to secure his second win of the series and the Dodgers' second title since moving to Los Angeles.

## 1965 World Champions

The Dodgers returned to the Fall Classic in 1965 after posting 97 wins during the regular season.

The Series started off poorly however for both the Dodgers and Don Drysdale, as "Big D" was roughed up for seven runs in the first three innings of Game 1, leaving the Twins and "Mudcat" Grant with a sizable lead en route to an 8-2 complete-game win. Game 2 featured more tremendous pitching by the Twins, as Jim Kaat went the distance allowing just one run while driving in two himself to outlast Sandy Koufax, 5-1.

With their backs to the wall, the Dodgers returned home and proceeded to dominate Games 3, 4, and 5. Claude Osteen tossed a five-hit, complete-game shutout in the 4-0 Game 3 victory. In Game 4, Drysdale would avenge his earlier defeat to Grant by striking out 11 on his way to a 7-2 complete-game win. Game 5 featured more Dodger starting pitching as Koufax went the distance to defeat Kaat, 7-0.

In Game 6, Grant worked on just two days rest to keep the Twins alive, tossing a complete game to beat Osteen 5-1. In the series-deciding Game 7, a solo home run by "Sweet" Lou Johnson was all Series MVP Sandy Koufax would need to clinch the 1965 title with a 2-0 complete-game, 10-strikeout effort.

After losing the World Series to the New York Yankees in 1977 and 1978, the Dodgers hoped the third time would be the charm in 1981, as they faced off with the Yanks again. Los Angeles took the National League West flag after a strike-shortened regular season and were led by rookie phenom Fernando Valenzuela.

Game 1 was in New York and the Yankees immediately jumped on Dodger starter Jerry Reuss, as Bob Watson hit a three-run home run in the first inning. That's all the support Ron Guidry needed as he went seven strong innings in the 5-3 Yankee win. In Game 2, Los Angeles sent Burt Hooton to the mound to face former Dodger hurler Tommy John. Hooton silenced the New York bats, allowing just one unearned run over six innings, but John was even better as he threw seven shutout innings allowing just three hits. Goose Gossage came on and pitched the final two innings to earn the save and combine with John on a complete-game four-hitter in the 3-0 win.

Game 3 back in Los Angeles got off to a better start for the Dodgers as Ron Cey hit a three-run homer in the first inning off starter Dave Righetti. Although he'd relinquish the early 3-0 lead on a two-run home run by Rick Cerone in the fourth inning, Fernando Valenzuela would settle in and send the Dodger Stadium crowd into a frenzy, by throwing a complete game in the Dodgers' 5-4 victory.

After falling behind 4-0 in the pivotal Game 4, the Dodgers exploded for 14 hits including a two-run pinch hit home run by Jay Johnstone. Los Angeles would score six runs over its final four innings to pick up the series tying 8-7 win. Game 5 was a complete reversal of the previous two, as Ron Guidry and Reuss hooked up in a classic pitcher's duel. The Dodgers trailed 1-0 into the seventh inning when Pedro Guerrero and Steve Yeager drilled back-to-back home runs off Guidry to take the lead, 2-1. Reuss would go the distance and give Los Angeles a 3-2 series lead.

As the series shifted back to New York for Game 6, Hooton's arm and Guerrero's bat ensured that the third time would indeed be the charm for the Dodgers. Guerrero picked up three hits, including a home run while driving in five runs on his way to sharing MVP honors with Cey and Yeager in the Dodger franchise's fifth World Championship.

## 1988 World Champions

The 1988 World Series gave fans what was later voted as “The Greatest Sports Moment in Los Angeles History” when Kirk Gibson hit a dramatic pinch-hit, walk-off, two-run home run off future Hall of Fame closer Dennis Eckersley of the Oakland A’s. Game 1 was dominated by the long ball, as Mickey Hatcher got Los Angeles out to a 2-0 lead in the first inning with a homer off of A’s starter and 20-game winner Dave Stewart. Jose Canseco answered back for Oakland by blasting a grand slam giving the A’s a 4-2 lead. Trailing 4-3 in the ninth inning and facing the best closer in baseball, N.L.

MVP Gibson made his only appearance of the series despite injuries to both legs and launched a ball into the Right Field Pavilion to win the game, 5-4. The home run prompted Hall of Fame broadcaster Vin Scully to utter the now famous call, “In a year that has been so improbable, the impossible has happened.”

Riding the wave of momentum from Gibson’s heroics into Game 2, the Dodgers got a masterful performance from 1988 Cy Young Award winner Orel Hershiser and won, 6-0. The man who posted a Major League-record 59 consecutive scoreless innings during the regular season continued his dominance into the postseason by throwing a complete-game, three-hit shutout.

As the series shifted north to Oakland for Game 3, the shell-shocked A’s, with their backs to the wall got a walk-off homer of their own when Mark McGwire went deep with one out in the ninth inning off former A’s pitcher Jay Howell to give Oakland the 2-1 victory. Howell would rebound in Game 4 however, as he replaced an effective Tim Lincecum and pitched the final 2.1 innings to pick up the save in the Dodgers’ 4-3 win. In Game 5, the Dodgers got a pair of two-run homers from Hatcher and Mike Davis in the 5-2 win. Series MVP Hershiser did the rest, as he struck out nine in another brilliant complete-game effort to clinch the series and shock the heavily favored A’s.

## 1966 National League Champions

The 1966 Series between the Baltimore Orioles and the Los Angeles Dodgers turned out to be a showcase for Baltimore's young pitchers. Game 1 in Los Angeles pitted Dave McNally against Dodger ace Don Drysdale, but it was reliever Moe Drabowsky who stole the show. Drabowsky replaced McNally in the third inning and would shut down the Dodgers, allowing just one hit while striking out 11 over the final 6.2 innings to pick up the Game 1 win. The O's got to Drysdale early when future Hall of Famers Frank Robinson and Brooks Robinson hit back-to-back home runs to give Baltimore an early 3-0 lead. The Dodgers fought back with single runs in the second and third innings, getting a solo home run from Jim Lefebvre and then Jim Gilliam walked to force in a run to cut the lead to 3-2. Unbeknownst to the Dodgers, this would be their final run of the 1966 Series.

Game 2 at Dodger Stadium brought two future Hall of Famers to the mound as 27-game winner Sandy Koufax would do battle with Jim Palmer. The expected pitcher's duel lived up to the hype for the first four innings, but center fielder Willie Davis committed three errors in the fifth inning, which allowed the Orioles to score three unearned runs off Koufax. Palmer would take over from there as he hurled a complete-game, four-hit shutout to give the Orioles a two-games-to-none lead heading back to Baltimore.

Game 3 in Baltimore was a clash between Claude Osteen and Wally Bunker. Osteen faced just one over the minimum through 4.2 innings but a solo home run with two outs in the fifth from Paul Blair broke the scoreless tie. Bunker would record the Orioles' second straight complete-game shutout over the Dodgers, scattering six hits while striking out six, giving Baltimore a commanding 3-0 series lead.

Game 4 produced yet another epic pitcher's duel. In a game that lasted just 1:45, the rematch between Game 1 starters McNally and Drysdale followed a familiar pattern to the previous three games. A solo homer from Series MVP Frank Robinson in the fourth inning broke a scoreless tie and McNally would toss Baltimore's third straight complete-game shutout to win the 1966 Series in a sweep.

## 1974 National League Champions

Behind a solid pitching corps and a young infield known as the "Mod Squad," the Dodgers made their return to the Series ready to challenge the defending back-to-back World Champion Oakland Athletics.

In the first all-California Series, Game 1 was a display of power and pitching as Reggie Jackson got the A's the early lead with a homer to center in the second inning. The lead would grow to 3-1 as Ken Holtzman and Rollie Fingers combined to keep the Dodgers offense in check. Jimmy Wynn would hit a solo blast in the ninth inning off Fingers to get Los Angeles to within one, but Jim "Catfish" Hunter, who had recorded only one career save, came on to get the final out in the A's 3-2 victory. The Dodgers rebounded in Game 2 behind the right arm of Don Sutton. An RBI single from Steve Yeager and a two-run home run from Joe Ferguson provided the offense in the 3-2 win.

Like the first two games, Game 3 went down to the wire, as homers from Bill Buckner and Willie Crawford pulled the Dodgers to within one run, but Fingers would close the door on a late rally to get Hunter the 3-2 win. In Game 4 Holtzman not only out-dueled 20-game winner Andy Messersmith, but homered off him to give the A's an early lead. A two-run pinch-hit single in the sixth inning by Jim Holt broke a 2-2 tie to give Oakland the lead for good, as Fingers would again come in and nail down a 5-2 Oakland victory.

The Dodgers sent Sutton to the mound to play the role of stopper in Game 5. He did just that as he matched Vida Blue pitch for pitch for six innings, but a solo home run in the seventh inning by Joe Rudi off NL Cy Young Award winner Mike Marshall gave the A's a 3-2 win and their third straight World Series title.

## 1977 National League Champions

In the Dodgers' return to the World Series after a three-year absence, the Blue Crew was led by new manager Tommy Lasorda. The 1977 team was a historic one, as it became the first team ever to have four players (Steve Garvey, Reggie Smith, Ron Cey and Dusty Baker) with 30 or more homers in a season, en route to 98 wins and a sixth National League pennant in L.A.

The 1977 Fall Classic would be a rematch of the 1941, 1947, 1949, 1952, 1953, 1955, 1956 and 1963 series as the Dodgers faced the New York Yankees fresh off a 100-win regular season. Game 1 was one for the ages, as the Dodgers got a pinch-hit RBI single from Lee Lacy in the ninth inning to knot the game at 3-3. Things stayed that way until the 12th inning when Paul Blair picked up his only hit of the series with a walk-off RBI single to give the Yankees the 4-3 win. Game 2 was a power display by the Dodgers as Smith, Cey, Steve Yeager and Garvey all hit homers and pitcher Burt Hooton went the distance, allowing just one run while striking out eight in the 6-1 win in New York.

Despite a game-tying three-run homer from Baker, Tommy John was outpitched by Mike Torrez, who would hurl a complete game in the Yanks' 5-3 victory. In Game 4 the Dodgers were shut down by southpaw Ron Guidry. A home run by Davey Lopes was all the Dodgers could muster off Guidry in the 4-2 defeat.

With their backs to the wall, Los Angeles dominated Game 5 at Dodger Stadium, winning 10-4 behind Don Sutton's complete game and homers from Yeager and Smith. As the series returned to New York, Reggie Jackson took center stage by belting three homers on three consecutive swings off three different Dodger pitchers.

## 1978 National League Champions

One year after dropping the 1977 World Series to the New York Yankees, the Dodgers posted 95 wins in the regular season and faced the Yankees again in October in a World Series rematch. The series began in Los Angeles and in Game 1, Tommy John faced off against 20-game winner Ed Figueroa. Figueroa was victimized by two Davey Lopes long balls in the Dodgers' 11-5 triumph. John did the rest, pitching into the eighth.

Game 2 featured a matchup on the mound between the Dodgers' 19-game winner Burt Hooton and Yankees future Hall of Famer Jim "Catfish" Hunter. Hunter was cruising along with a 2-1 lead until the sixth inning, when third baseman Ron Cey hit a two-out, three-run home run to give the Dodgers a 4-2 lead. Los Angeles would carry a narrow 4-3 lead into the ninth inning when 21-year-old pitcher Bob Welch was summoned from the bullpen with the potential go-ahead runs on first and second with one out. After getting Yankee great Thurman Munson to fly out to right, Welch faced "Mr. October" Reggie Jackson in one of the most intense battles in World Series history. Welch went right after Jackson and blew a 3-2 fastball by him to give the Dodgers a 4-3 win and a 2-0 series lead.

With their backs against the wall, the Yankees returned home in desperate need of a win. That's exactly what they got as Ron Guidry pitched a complete-game gem allowing just one run and stranding 11 Dodgers on base. Game 4 pitted Game 1 starters John and Figueroa in a rematch. The Dodgers jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the top of the fifth inning when Reggie Smith homered with two on. The game stayed that way until a controversial non-call involving Jackson purposely obstructing a throw from Bill Russell on the back end of a potential inning ending double play. Due to the ball hitting Jackson, Munson scored and changed the momentum of the game and possibly the series. This call has since been thought of as the key moment in the series.

The momentum of Game 4 carried over to Game 5 for the Yanks, as Munson would pick up three hits and drive in five in the 12-2 victory. Rookie Jim Beattie shined on the mound for New York, throwing a complete game.

Game 6 was all New York from the start, as it pounded out 11 hits in a 7-2 win to clinch back-to-back World Series titles over the Dodgers. The game was highlighted by Jackson's homer off Welch to avenge his dramatic strikeout to end their Game 2 showdown. Bucky Dent, who hit .417 in the series, was named series MVP.
