2018 SEASON

- In his first season with the Reds posted a 2.53 ERA, the second-lowest of his career, in 57 relief apps.
- The Reds went 30-27 in games in which he pitched.
- Stranded 25-28 inherited base runners, the best percentage on the staff (89%).
- 16 times threw more than 1.0 inning, 8 times threw at least 2.0 innings and twice threw a season-high 2.1 innings (5/12 at LAD, 7/27 vs Phi, both scoreless).
- On 9/30 vs Pit, in the Reds' season finale, made the 500th appearance of his Major League career.
- Began the season on the 10-day disabled list with right shoulder inflammation...came off the DL after making 3 rehab apps for Louisville from 4/20-4/25.
- In the bottom of the fourth inning on 4/27 at Min made his Reds debut and earned the 15-9 victory after the Reds scored 6 runs in the top of the fifth to take a 10-8 lead.
- Won his first 5 decisions, the longest winning streak of his career and the longest by a Reds pitcher in 2018.
- In the 5-3 win on 5/12 at LAD, retired 7 of his 8 batters and didn't allow a run over a season-high 2.1 innings...was his longest relief appearance since a career-high 2.2 innings on 6/6/09 for Bal at Oak...also threw 2.1 innings on 7/27 vs Phi, also scoreless.
- On 7/7 at Cubs allowed a home run to Javier Báez leading off the seventh inning, snapping Hernandez' 32-inning homerless streak...was Hernandez' first HR allowed since 9/23/17 for Ari vs Mia and the only homer he allowed in his first 31 apps and 36.0 innings of 2018.
- 9 times pitched on consecutive days...never in his career pitched on 3 straight days.

2017: In 64 relief apps for the Angels and Diamondbacks posted a sterling 3.11 ERA...from 7/8-8/12 did not allow a run in 14 apps or 12.2 innings, both single-season career highs...that stretch spanned 8 apps for the Angels (8.2ip) and 6 apps for the Diamondbacks (4ip)...made 2 scoreless relief apps vs the Dodgers in the National League Division Series...went to spring training with the Giants as a non-roster invitee...was released on 3/24 and 3 days later was signed by the Braves to a minor league contract...on 4/24 was traded to the Angels and on 7/31 was traded to the Diamondbacks...became a free agent following the season...on 1/30/18 was signed by the Reds to a 2-year contract through the 2019 season.

2016: In his only season in Philadelphia ranked T19th in the National League with 70 apps...average 9.91 strikeouts per 9 innings...over 10 apps from 8/27-9/24 produced a season-best 10.2-inning scoreless streak...also had a 10-inning scoreless streak from 4/23-5/12 (7g, 13k, 11bb).

2015: Began the season on the 15-day disabled list while recovering from 3/24/14 "Tommy John" surgery to repair the torn ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow...did not allow more than 3 earned runs in any of his 40 apps...average 8.82 strikeouts per 9 innings.

2014: Missed the following 3/24 “Tommy John” surgery to repair the torn ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow (Dr. James Andrews).

2013: Made 62 apps for the Diamondbacks and posted a 0.93 ERA in 9 apps for Class AAA Reno...was optioned to Reno on 8/10 and after he returned to Ari in September recorded a 0.64 ERA in 14 apps...from 7/12-9/16 recorded at least 1 strikeout in 16 consecutive apps.

2012: Ranked among National League relief leaders in strikeouts (4th, 98), strikeouts per 9 innings (6th, 12.91) and opponents' batting average (7th, .190)...held righthanded hitters to a .145 average, fifth-lowest among all Major League pitchers with a minimum of 100 at bats (Jake McGee .098, Jesse Crain .129, Craig Kimbrel .136, Ronald Belisario .142)...recorded at least 2 strikeouts in 31 apps, fifth-most in the NL (Aroldis Chapman 43, Kimbrel 40, Ernesto Frieri 36, Kenley Jansen 33)...on 6/22 vs Cubs became the first Diamondbacks pitcher to record a save and collect his first career hit in same game since Jose Valverde in 2003...from 7/19-8/31 recorded at least 1 strikeout in 19 straight apps, the longest streak of his career and the longest by a Diamondbacks reliever since Juan Cruz' 21-game strikeout streak from 8/29/06-6/12/07.

2011: Ranked among the Diamondbacks' all-time single-season leaders with 23 holds (4th) and 74 apps (T6th)...ranked among National League relief leaders in holds (T6th), opponents' BA (12th, .193) and strikeouts (T12th)...limited lefthanded hitters to a .171 average, fourth-lowest in the NL among relievers...took over as closer on 7/1, when J.J. Putz was disabled...from 7/2-7/18 converted saves in a career-best 7 consecutive apps without allowing a hit (6.1ip)...made 4 apps vs the Brewers in the National League Division Series.

2010: Made his first 8 apps as a starter (1-5, 5.31) and his last 33 apps in relief (7-3-2, 3.16)...earned his first career save in a 4-3 win vs NYY on 6/10...earned his second save just 5 days later in a 4-1 win at SF.

2009: In his Major League debut made 19 starts and 1 relief appearance for the Orioles...with a 5-1 win on 5/28 vs Det became 1 of 5 O's rookie in 2009 to win his debut (Koji Uehara, Brad Bergesen, Jason Berken, Brian Matusz), the most in any season since 6 Chicago White Stockings pitchers won first career apps in 1888.

PERSONAL: Attended Cosumnes River College in Sacramento, CA, where in 2005 he established the school's single-season strikeout record (119)...also established school records for career strikeouts (224) and career victories (20, tied)...his brother, Ray, also pitched professionally...follow on Twitter @DHern_30.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- One of the Major Leagues' most reliable relievers has posted a sterling 2.69 ERA over 452 career apps for the Pirates, Brewers and Reds.
- Over the last 7 years beginning in 2012, his first full Major League season, his 2.66 ERA ranks fourth-best among all pitchers who made at least 440 apps (Craig Kimbrel 1.94, Kenley Jansen 2.21, Tony Watson 2.56).
- Also from 2012-2018, among all Major League relievers ranks T2nd with 65 GIDPs induced (Brad Ziegler 86, Jim Johnson 65) and 10th with a ground ball rate of 62.0%.
- Since his Major League debut in 2011 has thrown 826 ground balls, third-most by any pitcher in that span (Brad Ziegler 1101, Jim Johnson 930).
- Is the only pitcher in Reds history to produce an ERA below 2.00 (1.94) while making more than 70 apps (72).
- Began the 2018 season with 55 apps without allowing more than 1 run, the longest single-season consecutive games streak by any pitcher in Reds history.
- In 2018 voting of the local chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America, received the Johnny Vander Meer Award as the Reds' Most Outstanding Pitcher and the Joe Nuxhall Good Guy Award.
- In both 2015 and 2016 received the Chuck Tanner Award, presented annually by the Pittsburgh chapter of the BBWAA to the Pirates player most cooperative with the media.
- Also in 2016 was the Pirates' nominee for the prestigious Roberto Clemente Award for representing baseball on and off the field through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy and positive contributions.
- Helped anchor the Pirates' bullpen during their 3-year Postseason run from 2013-2015.
- Pitched more than 1.0 inning in 7 of his 11 Major League saves.

2018 SEASON

- In voting of the local chapter of the BBWAA, received the Johnny Vander Meer Award as the Reds' Most Outstanding Pitcher and the Joe Nuxhall Good Guy Award.
- Led the pitching staff in apps, tied for 12th-most in the National League.
- His 1.94 ERA was the lowest of his career and fourth-best in the Major Leagues among all pitchers who threw at least 78.0 innings (Oak's Blake Treinen 0.78, NYM's Jacob deGrom 1.70, TB's Blake Snell 1.89).
- Became the first pitcher in franchise history to produce an ERA below 2.00 while making more than 70 apps and only the fourth Reds pitcher with an ERA below 2.00 in 70 apps or fewer...LHP John Franco (1988), RHP Doug Bair (1978) and RHP Ted Abernathy (1967) each produced an ERA below 2.00 in exactly 70 apps.
- Following 2.0 scoreless innings on 5/4 vs Mia that dropped his ERA from 2.12 to 1.89, his season ERA stayed below 2.00 following all but 2 apps the rest of the season (2.04 on 9/20, 2.01 on 9/23)...finished the season with 4 scoreless apps (3.2ip) to drop his ERA from 2.04 to its final 1.94.
- Began the season with 55 apps without allowing more than 1 run, the longest single-season consecutive games streak by any pitcher in Reds history and the longest single-season streak by any pitcher in the Major Leagues since Cle's Andrew Miller produced a 57-game streak from 4/7-9/3, 2016.
- Didn't allow more than 1 run in a game until his 56th appearance, 8/20 at Mil (0.2ip, 2r)...the previous franchise single-season record for consecutive apps without allowing more than 1 run was 46, shared by Jeff Shaw (1997) and Manny Parra (2013)...until 8/20 at Mil, Hughes hadn't allowed more than 1 run in a game since 7/26/17 for Mil at Wsh (0.1ip, 4r) and posted a 1.32 ERA during that 78-game streak.

- Through 6/13, his ERA was a season-best 0.99 through 31 apps (36.1ip, 4er).
- Recorded 7 saves, his single-season career high...5 of his 7 saves required more than 3 outs.
- 16 times threw more than 1.0 inning, 8 times pitched at least 2.0 innings and on 4/24 vs Atl threw a season-high 2.2 innings (2h, 0r, 0bb, 2k).
- Induced 13 GDP, just 2 behind Major League leader Brian Flynn of the Royals.
- The Reds went 36-36 in games in which he pitched.
- 18 times pitched on consecutive days, tying Raisel Iglesias for the staff high, and 4 times pitched on 3 consecutive days (4/9-4/11, 5/22-5/24, 8/28-8/30, 9/8-9/10)...never has pitched on 4 consecutive days.
- On 4/24 vs Atl threw 2.2 scoreless innings to earn his first victory as a Red...was his longest outing since 7/9/16 for Pit vs Cubs (career-high 3ip)...his 42 pitches were 6 shy of his career high.
- In the eighth inning on 5/12 at LAD made his 400th Major League appearance...produced 5 outs in 4 batters for the fifth save of his career, his first of the season.
- In the 5-4 win on 5/24 vs Pit and the 6-5 win on 5/26, for the first time in his career produced saves in consecutive apps.
- From 5/4-6/13 produced scoreless streaks of 15 apps and 19.1 innings, both career highs and both the longest by a Reds pitcher in 2018...those streaks were snapped at Pit on 6/17, when he was charged with a run scored off Raisel Iglesias.
- From 5/14-5/16 retired a season-high 16 consecutive batters.
- Threw 35.1 homerless innings between Yadier Molina's solo HR on 4/21 at StL and Avisail García's solo HR on 7/2 vs WSox.
- From 8/20-8/28 allowed at least 1 run in a career-high 3 straight apps for only the second time (8/4-8/9, 2012).
- On 8/25 at Cubs (Daniel Murphy solo) & 8/28 vs Mil (Christian Yelich 2-run), allowed HR in consecutive apps for only the second time in his career (2g, 8/7-8/9, 2012).

2017: On 3/31 was released by the Pirates...2 days later was signed by the Brewers and posted a sterling 3.02 ERA in 67 relief apps...opponents hit just .231...his 67 apps ranked T24th in the National League...in the Brewers' 7-4 win on 5/12 vs NYM earned his only save of the season, the fourth of his career...posted a 0.63 ERA in his last 19 apps of the season (14.1ip, 1er), including 13 scoreless apps in September...following the season was eligible for arbitration but was non-tendered and became a free agent...on 12/26 was signed by the Reds to a 2-year contract through the 2019 season with a club option for 2020.

2016: For the second straight year received the Chuck Tanner Award, presented annually by the local chapter of the BBWAA to the Pirates player most cooperative with the media...missed the first month of the season with a left latissimus muscle strain...made his season debut on 5/1...on 9/6 vs StL made his 300th appearance.

2015: For the Pirates made 76 apps, a career high and tied for fifth among all National League pitchers...made his third Opening Day roster (2012, 2013)...from 6/12-7/17 didn't allow a run over 15 apps and 14.2 innings, both career high scoreless streaks...was on the Postseason roster but didn't pitch in the NL Wild Card game, a 4-0 loss to the Cubs at PNC Park...received the Chuck Tanner Award for his cooperation with the media.

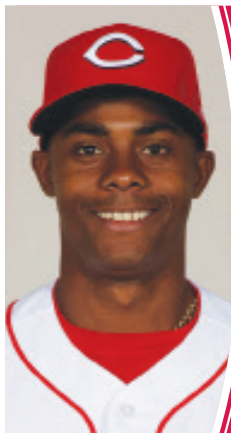
