Beato's 2013 Season Recap

- Went 1-1 with a 3.60 ERA (4 ER/10.0 IP) in 10 relief appearances during four stints with the Red Sox (6/16-6/20, 6/25, 7/10-8/1, 8/7-8/8).
- Spent most of the season with Triple-A Pawtucket of the Boston Red Sox organization.
- One of only four Pawtucket pitchers to post an ERA under 3.00 while appearing in more than 30 games.
- Racked up five saves in 34 games at Pawtucket, second-most on the team.
- Five wins with Pawtucket marked his most since going 6-10 between two clubs in 2009.
- Designated for assignment on 10/23 and was claimed off waivers by the Reds eight days later on 10/31.

Beato's Career Highlights

2012: Made 11 relief appearances between the New York Mets and Boston Red Sox...Began the season with New York but was acquired by Boston on 8/16 as the player to be named later to complete a deal for Kelly Shoppach (from 8/14)...Started the season on the New York disabled list with stiffness in his right shoulder...Made six of his 24 appearances with Triple-A Buffalo during a rehab assignment...Was designated for assignment on 12/19 to make room on the 40-man roster for RHP Ryan Dempster and was outrighted to Pawtucket two days later.

2011: Was selected from Baltimore in the December 2010 Rule 5 Draft and spent the season on the New York Mets roster...Selected to his first Opening Day roster...Ranked second in innings pitched and fifth in appearances among National League rookies...Stranded 25-of-36 inherited runners (69%), fourth-best among NL rookie pitchers...Made his Major League debut on Opening Day by working 2.0 scoreless innings in a 6-2 loss at FLA...Began the season by not allowing an earned run (allowed four unearned runs) in 18.2 innings, a Mets franchise record to begin a career...Snapped that streak on 5/22 at NYY after allowing two earned runs...Earned his first career victory in a 6-3 win at WSH on 4/27...Threw a career-high 3.0 innings, the most by a Mets reliever all season, in the 14.0-inning, 2-1 win at PHI on 5/1...Spent time on the disabled list in May with tendinitis in his right elbow.

2010: Tabbed as a mid-season Eastern League all-star with Double-A Bowie of the Orioles organization... Led the Baysox and ranked fifth in the EL with 16 saves...Also paced the club with a 2.11 ERA (14 ER/59.2 IP) and 43 appearances...Held opponents to a .225 average (49-for-218), including a .214 mark (24-for-112) vs. left-handed hitters...Posted a 1.34 ERA (5 ER/33.2 IP) in 16 outings longer than 1.0 inning and threw 3.0 innings in a performance four times...Had a 1.00 ERA (3 ER/27.0 IP) through the end of May, and 13 of his last 15 appearances beginning 7/15 were scoreless...Recorded his first professional save on 5/11 vs. Richmond...Placed on the disabled list on 8/23 and missed the remainder of the season.

2009: Combined for 25 starts and one relief appearance between Baltimore's High-A Frederick and Double-A Bowie clubs...Finished second on the Keys in innings (105.1) and starts (20) and tied for second in wins (five)...Tied a career high with eight strikeouts in a win on 4/26 vs. Potomac...Tossed 7.0 scoreless frames in his final start for the Keys on 7/29 vs. Salem...Took the loss in his Double-A debut on 8/5 at New Hampshire (5.2 IP, 6 H, 4 R, 4 ER, 2 BB, 3 K).

2008: Spent most of the season with High-A Frederick...Won three of his four starts in April...Gave up one run in four of seven outings before landing on the disabled list on 5/14...Rehabbed with two starts for the Rookie-level GCL Orioles, posting a 2.53 ERA (3 ER/10.2 IP) before returning to the Keys on 6/30...Following the season, rated as the No. 21 prospect in the Orioles season.

2007: Pitched the entire season with Single-A Delmarva...Led the team with 27 starts and 142.1 innings and tied for second with seven wins...Gave up two earned runs or less in 17 starts...Allowed three earned runs or less in seven consecutive starts from 5/25-6/26 with a 3.19 ERA (13 ER/36.2 IP) in that stretch...Was a member of the World Team at the All-Star Futures Game on 7/8 in San Francisco...Faced two batters in relief, recording a strikeout and allowing a single...Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 9 prospect in the Baltimore system after the season.

2006: Began his professional career with Short-A Aberdeen...Made four relief appearances before joining the rotation, and went 3-2 with a 2.79 ERA (16 ER/51.2 IP) in 10 starts...Did not allow an earned run in 5.0 innings in his first start on 7/17 vs. Jamestown...Surrendered three earned runs or less in each start...Tabbed as the second-best prospect in the New York-Penn League...Also named the fourth-best Orioles prospect by *Baseball America* following the season.

PERSONAL: Resides in Mulbury, FL...Grew up in Queens and graduated from Brooklyn's Xaverian High School...Missed his junior season following right elbow surgery...Attended St. Petersburg JC (FL)...Signed by Nick Presto (Orioles).

Harang's Career Recap

- The 12-year Major League veteran has averaged 29 starts per year and logged at least 140 innings nine times.
- Since 2004, Harang has started 289 games, ninth-most in the majors in that time. Also since 2004, he has started 267 games in the NL, the most of any pitcher in that span.
- Led the league in 2006 in both strikeouts (216) and wins (16). Since 2004, he ranks 10th in the majors with 1790.2 innings pitched.
- Established a Dodger franchise record on 4/13/12 at Dodger Stadium by striking out nine consecutive Padre hitters, breaking Johnny Podres' franchise record of eight set on 7/2/62 vs. PHI. He finished with 13 strikeouts in 6.1 innings, tying his career high for strikeouts (9/29/077) and became the first Dodger pitcher in the last 90 seasons to have 13 or more strikeouts in a game when pitching fewer than 7.0 innings.
- Led San Diego in 2011 with 14 wins, going 14-7 (.667) with a then career-low 3.64 ERA. Was his second-most wins in a season and most since a career-best 16 in 2006 and 2007.
- Made five consecutive Opening Day starts for the Cincinnati Reds from 2006-10.
- Finished fourth in the National League Cy Young voting with Cincinnati in 2007 after going 16-6. With the Reds in 2006, went 16-10 and tied for the National League lead in strikeouts (216) and complete games (6). In 2005, he led the Reds in wins (11), ERA (3.83), quality starts (19), innings pitched (211.2) and strikeouts (163).
- Was originally selected by the Texas Rangers in the sixth round of the 1999 draft and has made Major League appearances with the Oakland Athletics, Cincinnati Reds, San Diego Padres, Los Angeles Dodgers, Seattle Mariners and New York Mets.

Harang's 2013 Season Recap

- Agreed to terms on a one-year Major League contract with the Braves on 3/24/14.
- Began 2014 spring training with the Cleveland Indians and combined to go 2-1 with a 4.91 ERA over five appearances (three starts) while fanning eight over 14.2 innings.
- Went 5-12 with a 5.40 ERA in 26 starts between Seattle and New York (NL) last year.
- Made 22 appearances (all starts) for Seattle (5-11, 3.52) before finishing the season with the Mets. He signed with the Mets to a minor league contract on 9/1 and joined the Major League club on 9/9. With the Mets, he went 0-1 with a 3.52 ERA in four starts.
- Struck out 10 in his Mets debut on 9/12 vs. WSH, his 13th career double-digit strikeout game and second of the season (also, 6/11 vs. HOU).
- After joining the Mets on 9/12 through the end of the season, struck out 26 hitters, tied for the sixth-most in baseball and tied for the second-most in the NL in that stretch.
- Harang was one of 11 major leaguers to pitch at least two complete game shutouts last season, the second time in his career he has done so (also two shutouts in 2006). His eight shutouts since the start of 2004 are tied for seventh most in the majors.

Harang's Career Highlights

2012: Posted a career-low 3.61 ERA and reached double-digit victories for the second consecutive season and the sixth time in his career in his first season with the Dodgers...Ranked third on the club with 31 starts, 179.2 innings pitched and 131 strikeouts...His 179.2 innings were his most since 2008 (184.1 IP with CIN)... Limited opposing hitters to a .246 batting average, including a .233 mark against right-handers (80-for-344)... Was especially tough with runners in scoring position, holding the opposition to a .202 average (33-for-163)... Was one of the NL's best pitchers from 5/1-through the All-Star break, going 5-3 with a 2.64 ERA (21 ER/71.2 IP), the fifth-lowest ERA in the NL, in 12 starts during that span...Made 16 quality starts and pitched 6.0 or more innings on 17 occasions, going 8-1 with a 2.45 ERA (30 ER/110.1 IP) in those games...Established a franchise record on 4/13 at Dodger Stadium by striking out nine consecutive Padre hitters, breaking Johnny Podres' franchise record of eight set on 7/2/62 vs. PHI...He finished the night with 13 strikeouts in 6.1 innings, tying his career high for strikeouts (9/29/07) and became the first Dodger pitcher in the last 90 seasons to have 13 or more strikeouts in a game when pitching fewer than 7.0 innings.

2011: Led San Diego with 14 wins, going 14-7 (.667) with a then career-low 3.64 ERA...Was his second-most wins a season and most since a career-best 16 in 2006, 2007...Missed time from 6/13-7/9 (26 games) while on the 15-day DL due to a right foot contusion...Made one rehab start for Single-A Lake Elsinore...Went 10-3 (.769) in starts following a Padres loss in 2011...Posted 18 quality starts, third most on the team behind Mat Latos and Tim Stauffer who both had 20 quality starts...His 18 quality starts were his most in a season since a career-best 20 quality starts in 2007 for Cincinnati...Went 3-4 with a 2.40 ERA (12 ER/45.0 IP), a .221 (36-for-163) opponents' batting average and 36 strikeouts against 14 walks over his last seven starts of

the season from 8/20-9/24...Was 8-5 with a 3.05 ERA (37 ER/109.1 IP) and a .240 (97-for-405) opponents' batting average in 17 starts at home...Went 5-5 with a 3.11 ERA (28 ER/81.0 IP) in 13 starts against NL West opponents...Was 4-1 with a 2.89 ERA (14 ER/43.2 IP) in seven starts against NL Central teams.

2010: Appeared in 22 games (20 starts), missing time while on the disabled list from 7/6-8/26 with lower lumbar spasms...Was the Reds' Opening Day starter for the fifth straight season (2006-10), tying Pete Donohue (1923-27) and Mario Soto (1982-86) for the club's consecutive Opening Day starts record (Soto had six overall)...Posted a 6-7 record and 5.02 ERA (56 ER/101.1 IP) over 17 starts before being placed on the disabled list...Returned from the DL and appeared in five games, making three starts...Did not factor in a decision while recording a 7.94 ERA (10 ER/11.1 IP) after returning...Was left off the Reds' playoff roster for the National League Division Series -- Cincinnati was swept in three games by Philadelphia...Finished the season with six wins for the third consecutive season.

2009: Made 26 starts for the Reds, his lowest total since splitting the 2003 season between Oakland and Cincinnati...Underwent an appendectomy on 8/22, was placed on the disabled list on 8/23 and missed the remainder of the season...Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start...Went 1-1 with a 2.14 ERA over his last three starts, dropping his ERA from 4.43 to a season-ending 4.21 mark...Tied for second on the Reds' staff with 14 quality starts...Reds went 11-15 overall in his 26 outings...From 5/30-8/3, went 0-9 with a 5.49 ERA...Snapped the career-high nine-game losing streak on 8/9 with a win at SF...The losing streak tied BAL's Jason Berken for the longest in the Majors in 2009...It was the longest single-season losing streak by a Reds pitcher since Tom Hume lost nine straight in 1978...Recorded the 1,000th strikeout of his career (Derrek Lee) on 4/21 at CHI...His 1,000th strikeout as a Red came on 7/18 vs. MIL (Manny Parra)...Connected for his first career home run on 7/24 at CHI off Randy Wells.

2008: Made 30 appearances (29 starts) for the Reds, finishing 6-17 with a 4.78 ERA (98 ER/184.1 IP)...Had a career-high 17 losses tied HOU's Brandon Backe for the most in the NL...Missed time while on the disabled list from 7/13-8/9 with a strained right forearm...His 17 quality starts on the year ranked third on the team behind Edinson Volquez (20) and Bronson Arroyo (18)...Made a relief appearance on 7/25 at SD, his first since 8/11/06...Was the ninth of the Reds' 10 pitchers to work in the 18-inning loss to the Padres...Tossed 4.0 shutout innings from the 13th to the 16th...Was chosen as the recipient of the Joe Nuxhall Good Guy Award from the local chapter of the BBWAA following the season...Was also the club's nominee for the Marvin Miller Man of the Year Award.

2007: Won the Johnny Vander Meer Award as the Reds' most outstanding pitcher for the second time in three seasons...Finished fourth in NL Cy Young Award voting after going 16-6 with a 3.73 ERA (96 ER/231.2 IP) in 34 starts...Tied his career high in victories and established a new career mark in strikeouts (218)...Led the Reds in wins, starts, complete games (two), innings pitched and strikeouts...Third consecutive year leading the team in wins and fourth straight leading in strikeouts...Ranked among NL leaders in starts (T-2nd), innings pitched (2nd), strikeouts (2nd), walks per 9.0 IP (2.0, 2nd), winning percentage (.727, 4th), wins (T-5th) and strikeouts per 9.0 IP (8.5, 7th)...In addition to his two complete games, also tossed 9.0 innings in a 12-inning, 2-1 win at SD on 5/15 and a career-high 10.0 innings in a 12-inning, 2-1 win vs. MIL on 7/23...Became the first Reds pitcher to throw 10.0 innings in a game since Rick Mahler on 8/30/89...Recorded quality starts in 20 of 34 outings...Lost his final two starts, the only time losing consecutive starts during the season.

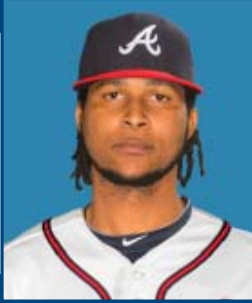

Santana's 2013 Season Recap

- Ranked ninth in the American League in ERA (3.24), eighth in WHIP (1.14) and opponents' batting average (.238) and tied for fourth in "quality" starts (23). He allowed just 51 walks in 211.0 innings, for his lowest walks per 9 innings ratio (2.18) since his career-best total (1.93) in 2008.
- Named the Royals' Pitcher of the Month in April, going 3-1 with a 2.00 ERA (8 ER in 36.0 IP). Also went 2-0 with a 1.99 ERA (9 ER in 40.2 IP) in June.
- Held opponents to a .207 batting average away from home, which ranked fourth in the A.L.
- Posted a 5-3 record with a 1.99 ERA (15 ER in 68.0 IP) in 10 starts against A.L. Central foes. His 1.99 ERA and .187 opponents' batting average within the division were tops among pitchers with 10 or more starts vs. the AL Central. His 0.87 WHIP within the division was second in the league among pitchers with 50.0+ innings pitched.

2011: Set career-bests with a 3.38 ERA and 228.2 IP while matching a career-high with 33 starts...Among AL leaders, ranked tied for sixth in starts, tied for fourth in complete games and seventh in innings pitched...Tossed 6.0 innings or more in each of final 17 starts...Tossed a no-hitter on 7/27 at CLE, allowing an unearned run and a walk, with 10 strikeouts...Was the eighth individual no-hitter in Angels' history and the first since Mike Witt's perfect game in 1984...Following his no-hitter, was named the Co-AL Player of the Week, 7/25-31 (with KC's Billy Butler)...With a complete-game victory 8/2 vs. MIN, became first pitcher since 1991 (Tommy Greene, PHI) to earn a complete-game win in first start after a no-hitter...The no-hitter was the first in the history of Cleveland's Progressive Field...Was the sixth Dominican native to toss a no-no, joining Juan Marichal (1963), Ramon Martinez (1995), Jose Jimenez (1999), Ubaldo Jimenez (2010) and Francisco Liriano (2011)...Santana and Liriano both hail from the same city, San Cristobal, DR...Pitched at least 7.2 innings allowing one run or less in five straight starts (7/22-8/12/11), becoming the first Angel to accomplish the feat since Rudy May did so in five consecutive starts from 8/29-9/15/72...Since 1990, only three other pitchers have accomplished the feat: Chris Carpenter (seven, 2005), Roger Clemens (five, 1997) and John Smoltz (five, 1992).

2010: Tossed six innings-or-more in 17 of final 19 starts and 28 of 33 starts overall...Tossed seven innings or more 16 times, going 11-2 in those starts...Tallied a career-high 17 victories, tied for the seventh-most wins

2008: His 214 strikeouts ranked second in the AL and were most by an Angel since Chuck Finley had 215 in 1996 and most by a right-hander since Nolan Ryan (223) in 1979...Among AL leaders, ranked tied for seventh in wins, fourth in innings pitched, second in strikeouts and fourth in average against...Since 1920, Joe Saunders and Santana were the eighth pair of teammates to start 6-0 simultaneously...The previous duo was Pedro Martinez (7-0) and John Burkett (7-0) of the 2002 Boston Red Sox (Courtesy of STATS LLC)... Selected to first career All-Star Game, allowing a run in one inning of work (5th) in the AL’s 4-3, 15-inning win at Yankee Stadium...Struck out seven or more batters in seven straight starts, 8/1-9/4, becoming first Angel pitcher to do so since Nolan Ryan in 1978 (seven starts).
