- As MVP of the Futures Game at Nationals Park sent his bat to the Cooperstown Hall of Fame...went 2-for-2 with a 438-foot HR and a triple.
- Among Florida State League leaders ranked T3rd in runs scored and walks, fourth in on-base percentage, T4th in stolen bases and ninth in hitting...with 25 steals ranked third among all Reds minor league batters.
- Was voted by *Baseball America* the Futures Game's best hitter and the Florida State League outfielder with the best throwing arm.
- Was rated by *Baseball America* the fifth-best prospect in the Florida State League and by MLB.com the seventh-best prospect in the Arizona Fall League.

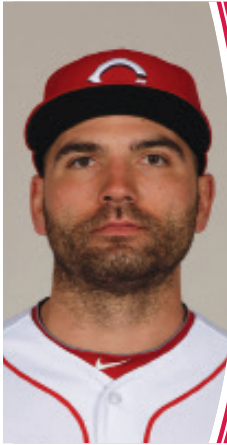

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Is the 2010 National League Most Valuable Player and Hank Aaron Award winner, a 6-time NL All-Star, a *Sporting News* NL All-Star and the only Reds first baseman ever to win a Rawlings Gold Glove Award.
- Received NL Most Valuable Player Award votes 7 times in the last 9 seasons, 6 times finished among the Top 10 and 3 times finished among the Top 3...finished first in 2010, sixth in 2011, 14th in 2012, sixth in 2013, third in 2015, seventh in 2016 and second by 2 points to Mia's Giancarlo Stanton in 2017 in the fourth-closest vote ever.
- 5 times was a finalist for the prestigious Hank Aaron Award, presented to the most outstanding offensive performer in each league...won the award in 2010...was a finalist in 2011, 2015, 2016 and 2017.
- 3 times was a finalist for the Rawlings Gold Glove Award for first basemen...won the award in 2011...was a finalist in 2017 and 2018.
- 6 times was voted by the Cincinnati chapter of the BBWAA the Ernie Lombardi Award as the Reds' MVP (unanimously in 2016 and 2017).
- Twice received the Lou Marsh Award as Canada's Athlete of the Year (2010, 2017)...is 1 of only 3 baseball players to win the prestigious award and the only one to win it more than once (Ferguson Jenkins 1974; Larry Walker 1998)...twice received the Syl Apps Award as Ontario's Athlete of the Year (2010, 2017).
- 7 times received the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame's Tip O'Neill Award (2010-2013, 2015-2017), sharing the honor in 2011 with Brewers pitcher John Axford...is the only player to win that award more than 2 years in a row and is 1 of only 2 players to win it more than 3 times (Larry Walker, 9 times).
- In March 2013 was voted by fans the Face of MLB.
- With 269 career HR ranks fifth on the club's all-time list (Johnny Bench 389, Frank Robinson 324, Tony Perez 287, Adam Dunn 270)...is the all-time leader in home runs at Great American Ball Park (148; Jay Bruce 2nd, 136).
- His 1,104 career walks are the most in Major League history by a player born in Canada (Larry Walker 2nd, 913)...his 269 HR are second-most by a Canadian (Larry Walker 383).
- Holds franchise records for career games played at first base (1,541) and intentional walks (138)...shares Joe Morgan's club career record for number of seasons with at least 100 walks (6)...holds franchise single-season records for walks (143 in 2015), on-base percentage (.474 in 2012), number of times on base safely via hit, walk or HBP (321 times in 2017), number of games reaching base safely (150g in 2017), number of games reaching base safely at least twice (107g in 2015 & 2017) and number of consecutive games reaching base safely at least twice (20g from 7/26-8/15, 2017)...shares Pete Rose's single-season franchise record for number of consecutive games reaching base safely (48g from 8/11-10/2, 2015).

- In the last 11 seasons led the Reds in batting average 8 times, in doubles 6 times and in hits 6 times.
- From 2007-2016 made 1,103 starts next to 2B Brandon Phillips, the most on the right side of the infield for any tandem in Reds history and the highest total by any active set of infielders...1B Frank McCormick and 2B Lonny Frey rank second in Reds history with 774 starts together.
- In the last 9 seasons led the National League in doubles once, in walks 5 times, in on-base percentage 7 times, in slugging once and in OPS twice (2010, 2017).
- Since 1900 is the only batter in Reds history and 1 of 9 players overall to lead the National League in walks for 3 straight seasons (2011-2013).
- Is the only Red and 1 of 6 players in Major League history to lead his league in on-base percentage for 4 straight years (2010-2013)...is the only Reds player and 1 of 6 players in Major League history to lead his league in on-base percentage at least 7 times, joining Barry Bonds (10) and Cooperstown Hall of Famers Ted Williams (12), Babe Ruth (10), Rogers Hornsby (9) and Ty Cobb (7).
- Is only the second player in Reds history to produce 30 doubles in 6 consecutive seasons (2008-2013; Pete Rose, 1965-70 & 1972-78) or 30 doubles in any 9 seasons (Rose, 13).
- With a minimum of 5,000 career at bats is 1 of only 19 players in modern Major League history to hit at least .300 (.311) with an on-base percentage of .400 (.427) and a slugging percentage of .500 (.530).
- Among active players ranks first in career on-base percentage (.427), first in career OPS (.957) and third in career batting average (.311; Miguel Cabrera, .316; Jose Altuve .316)...is 1 of only 3 active players with at least 1,600 hits and 1,000 walks (Miguel Cabrera, Albert Pujols).
- In the *Sporting News*' 2011 poll of baseball executives was rated the fourth-best player in baseball behind Albert Pujols, Troy Tulowitzki and Felix Hernandez.
- In 2010 became the 10th Reds player and third Canadian to win the Most Valuable Player Award...prior to Game 4 of the 2010 World Series received from Commissioner Bud Selig the Hank Aaron Award as the NL's best hitter...in his native Canada, was honored by 8 organizations for his 2010 MVP season...was ranked No. 1 in the *Toronto Sun's* 2010 list of most influential Canadians in baseball.
- Played for Canada in the 2009 World Baseball Classic and hit .556 (second among all WBC players) with a 1.111 slugging percentage (third best)...also played for Canada in the 2013 WBC.
- 5 times was the National League Player of the Week (9/21-9/27, 2009; 7/25-7/31, 2011; 5/13-5/19, 2013; 6/26-7/2, 2017; 4/23-4/29, 2018).
- In 2008 finished second in the National League Rookie of the Year Award voting, was a finalist for a Players Choice Award in the category of Outstanding NL Rookie, was a TOPPS Major League Rookie All-Star and was the Reds' MVP...in September 2008 received the National League Rookie of the Month Award.
- In 2007 was a TOPPS Class AAA All-Star, Louisville's Most Valuable Player, the International League's Rookie of the Year and an IL All-Star...in May 2007 was Louisville's and the Reds' Hitter of the Month.
- Played in the 2006 Southern League All-Star Game and 2007 Triple-A All-Star Game...played for the World Team in MLB's All-Star Futures Games in Pittsburgh (2006) and San Francisco (2007).
- In 2006 was the Southern League's MVP and batting champion, TOPPS' Southern League Player of the Year and the Reds organization's minor league Hitter of the Year...also was a *Baseball America* Minor League and Class AA All-Star and a TOPPS Class AA All-Star.
- In 2005 was selected to play for Team Canada in the IBAF XXXVI World Cup in Amsterdam, Netherlands.
- In the minor leagues produced 5 career grand slams.
- In 2007 became the 14th native Canadian to appear for the Reds (LHP Rheel Cormier, RHP Ryan Dempster, RHP Chris Reitsma, OF Glen Gorbous, OF Bert Sincock, OF Doc Miller, P Clarence Currie, P Bob Hooper, OF Nigel Wilson, P Rube Vickers, OF Andy Kyle, P Win Kellum, OF Tip O'Neill).
- Graced the cover of the 8/30/10 issue of *Sports Illustrated*, the only Reds player to do so since Ken Griffey Jr. on 6/14/04.
- On 3/17/13 made a guest voice appearance on *The Cleveland Show*... fellow Major Leaguers Andre Ethier, Matt Kemp, David Ortiz and Jimmy Rollins also were featured in the episode in which star of the show Cleveland pursues his life-long dream of becoming a baseball scout.

2018 SEASON

- Was voted by his peers to his sixth All-Star team, the most All-Star apps ever by a player born in Canada (Larry Walker, 5)...in the bottom of the 10th inning of the American League's 8-6 win at Nationals Park, hit a solo HR off Tor's J.A. Happ...is 1 of 7 players and only the second Red to produce a home run in extra innings in the All-Star Game (Tony Perez, 1967, 15th inning)...is the only player born in Canada to homer in the All-Star Game.
- From 4/23-4/29 was the National League's Player of the Week, his fifth career weekly award.
- For the second straight season and third time overall was a finalist for the Rawlings Gold Glove Award for first basemen.
- For the seventh time in his career led the National League in on-base percentage (.417)...is 1 of only 6 players in Major League history to lead his league in on-base percentage at least 7 times (Ted Williams 12, Babe Ruth 10, Barry Bonds 10, Rogers Hornsby 7, Ty Cobb 7)...reached base safely in 127 of the 144 apps in which he had a plate appearance.
- Also among the National League leaders ranked third in walks, fifth in BA with RISP (.339), eighth in BA on the road (.311) and 10th in BA vs RHP (.298)...led the team in walks.
- Recorded at least 100 walks for the sixth time, tying Joe Morgan's franchise record.
- On 7/27 vs Phi drew his 136th career intentional walk (off Jake Thompson), a new franchise career record (Johnny Bench, 135 IBB)...finished the season with 138 career IBB.
- For the fourth time in his career produced more walks (108) than strikeouts (101).
- On 4/17 at Mil reached 1,000 walks in 1,446 apps, the fourth-fewest games to 1,000 walks in National League history...Pete Rose (1,210) is the only other player in Reds history with at least 1,000 walks.
- From 6/15-6/26 recorded a walk in 11 consecutive apps (14bb, .481obp), 2 games shy of the franchise record for walks in consecutive apps (Adam Dunn, 13g, 5/15-5/28, 2002)...that streak was snapped on 6/27 at Atl, when in the first inning he was ejected by HP umpire Carlos Torres following a called strike 3...was his eighth career ejection, his first since 9/9/15.
- Reached base safely 260 times, just 14 behind National League leader Freddie Freeman...fell short in his bid to become the 12th player in history to reach base via hit, walk or HBP at least 300 times in a season 4 times (Jeff Bagwell, Wade Boggs, Barry Bonds, Jimmie Foxx, Lou Gehrig, Todd Helton, Rogers Hornsby, Stan Musial, Pete Rose, Babe Ruth, Ted Williams)...Votto reached base safely at least 300 times in 2013, 2015 and 2017.
- From 8/17-8/29 was disabled with a right lower leg contusion suffered when he was hit by a Ryan Madson pitch on 8/4 at Wsh...in the Reds' 10 games after that HBP missed 4 starts and 2 games until he was disabled...on 8/7 & 8/8 at NYM missed consecutive starts for the first time since June 2016...missed 12 games while he was disabled.
- Prior to his disabling missed only 8 starts and 3 of the Reds' 121 games...missed his first full game on 4/12 vs StL, snapping at 202 games his streaks of consecutive games played and consecutive games started...prior to that 4/12 day off, had appeared in and started every Reds game since he was given the day off at StL on 9/2/16, when Ivan De Jesus Jr. played 1B...during his 202 games started streak played 1,733.1 of the Reds' 1,782.1 innings in the field (97%)...was the longest games started streak by a Reds player since Pete Rose started 370 consecutive games from 1973-1976.
- In the Wild Card ERA has produced the Reds' second-, third- and fourth-longest games played streaks (226g, 204g, 202g)...Aaron Boone played in 241 consecutive games over the 2002-2003 seasons.
- From 9/7-9/16 produced a season-high 8-game hitting streak and from 5/20-6/12 produced a season-high 20-game on-base streak.
- Made 131 starts batting third in the order, 1 start batting cleanup (5/18 at Cubs) and 8 starts batting second, including 7 straight starts batting second from 8/4-8/15.
- On 5/18 vs Cubs made his 29th career start batting cleanup (0-3, 1bb), his first appearance there since he hit fourth in both games of a DH on 5/15/14 vs SD...was his only start of the 2018 season batting fourth.
- In the first inning on 4/16 at Mil singled off Brent Suter for his 1,600th Major League hit...in the first inning on 4/17 at Mil recorded his 1,000th career walk (off Junior Guerra).
- His RBI-single in the sixth inning on 4/22 at StL was the 1,604th hit of his career, moving him past Justin Morneau and into second place alone on the all-time hits list by players born in Canada (Larry Walker 1st, 2,160 hits).
- In the 15-9 win on 4/27 at Min tied his career high by reaching base safely in 6 plate apps (single, double, HR, 2 walks, hit by a pitch)...he also did it on 5/18/13 at Phi (4h, 2bb)...before Votto did it in 2013, the last Reds batter to reach base safely 6 times in a 9-inning game was Sean Casey on 5/19/1999 at Col...Votto is the first Reds batter to twice reach base safely 6 times since Johnny Bench did it at Wrigley Field on 6/14/1975 and again there on 7/22/1979...in 2018, 16 Major League batters reached base 6 times.
- From 4/24-4/27 vs the Braves and Twins homered in 4 consecutive apps, a career high and 1 shy of the franchise record.

- His grand slam on 6/19 off Det's Matthew Boyd was his first home run since 5/13 at LAD...in his 30 apps between homers hit .321 (34-106, 9 2b, 2 3b, 9rbi, .442obp)... his grand slam on 9/8 vs SD off Robbie Erlin was his first home run since 7/9 at Cle, snapping a 36-game homerless streak that did not include his HR in the All-Star Game...was the second-longest single-season homerless stretch of his career (40g, 6/25-10/3, 2012).
- From 5/18-6/6 did not produce an RBI over 18 apps, the longest streak of his career without driving in a run.
- On 7/9 at Cle hit his 266th career HR, moving him past Matt Stairs into second place alone on the all-time list of HR by players born in Canada (Walker, 383).
- Just prior to Opening Day was announced as winner of the 2017 Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, presented annually to a Major League Baseball player who best exemplifies the giving character of Hall of Famer Lou Gehrig...the award permanently is maintained at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown.
- Also was the club's nominee for the MLBPA's Marvin Miller Man of the Year Award, which goes to the player whose on-field performance and contributions to his community most inspire others to higher levels of achievement.

2017 SEASON

- In the BBWAA's National League Most Valuable Player Award voting finished second by 2 points to Mia's Giancarlo Stanton in the fourth-closest vote ever... received MVP votes for the seventh time in the last 8 seasons, for the sixth time finished among the Top 10 and for the third time finished among the Top 3.
- Was a National League All-Star for the fifth time...also for the fifth time was a finalist for the Hank Aaron Award... for the second time was a finalist for the Rawlings Gold Glove Award for first basemen...was rated by field managers the best hitter in the National League.
- For the sixth time was voted by the local chapter of the BBWAA the Ernie Lombardi Award as the Reds' Most Valuable Player...for the second straight year, the vote was unanimous.
- For the seventh time received the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame's Tip O'Neill Award for his individual and team accomplishments and for the second time won the Lou Marsh Award as Canada's Athlete of the Year.
- Joined Babe Ruth (1921, 1924, 1926, 1930) and Ted Williams (1941, 1942, 1949) as the only players in Major League history to produce in a season at least 179 hits, 36 HR and 134 walks with 83 strikeouts or fewer.
- Joined Babe Ruth (35 in 1930) and Lou Gehrig (33 in 1936) as the only players in their age-33 seasons or older to produce at least 175 hits, 130 walks and a .450 on-base percentage...Votto turned 34 in September.
- Was the only player in the Major Leagues to produce at least 26 HR and 100 RBI while hitting .300 with an on-base percentage of .400 and a slugging percentage of .500.
- For the eighth time in his career hit least .300 with an on-base percentage of .400...for the seventh time in his career hit at least .300 with an on-base percentage of .400 and a slugging percentage of .500.

- Led the Major Leagues in on-base percentage, walks and intentional walks...tied KC's Alcides Escobar for the Major League lead in games started (162).
- Led the National League in walks for the fifth time, in on-base percentage for the sixth time and in both categories in the same season for the fourth time...also led the National League in OPS (1.032).
- Led the Major Leagues with a walks-to-strikeouts ratio of 1.61...LAD's Justin Turner was second at 1.05 and LAA's Mike Trout third at 1.04... only 14 times struck out more than once, including a season-high 3 strikeouts twice (8/18 at Atl, 9/30 at Chi)...from 6/5-6/16 did not strike out in a season-high 43 straight plate apps.

- Produced on-base streaks of 27 games (4/24-5/24), 29 games (7/26-8/26) and 32 games (8/27-end of the season)...his 32-game on-base streak tied teammate Zack Cozart's as the longest by a Reds batter this season and tied for the second-longest in the Major Leagues this year (SF's Eduardo Nunez, 33g).
- His 29-game on-base streak from 7/26-8/26 included a stretch from 7/26-8/15 during which he reached base safely at least twice in 20 straight games, a franchise record and 1 shy of Ted Williams' 1948 Major League record, and a 17-game hitting streak from 7/26-8/12 that tied his career high and ranked as the longest by a Reds batter in 2017...the 17-game hitting streak tied for the third-longest in the National League this season.

Adam Wainwright...was the 250th HR of his career and 135th HR at Great American Ball Park, tying Jay Bruce for most among all players in that ballpark...homered again the next night vs SD off Jhoulys Chacin to set new ballpark record with his 136th homer there.

- On 8/27 vs Pit, with 5 walks tied the club record for the second time (Hughie Critz on 5/28/1926 at StL, Johnny Bench on 7/22/1979 at Chi, Votto on 9/23/2013 vs NYM).

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Over the 2017 and 2018 seasons, his .714 winning percentage (25-10) ranks sixth (4th in NL) among the 72 Major League pitchers with at least 50 starts...in the same span among that group, his 3.20 ERA ranks 12th (6th in NL) and his 1.12 WHIP is 14th overall.
- In 2017 was a National League All-Star, the NL Pitcher of the Month for May and the NL Pitcher of the Week for 5/8-5/14.
- Also in 2017 finished ninth in the Baseball Writers' Association of America's National League Cy Young Award voting after posting a career-high 16 wins and career-low 2.72 ERA.
- Has made 16 career Postseason apps, including 2 starts, covering 3 Division Series, 3 League Championship Series and the 2017 & 2018 World Series (1-2, 4, 10, 26.1ip, 22h, 16r, 12er, 8bb, 28k, 9hr).
- Was the winning pitcher in the longest game in World Series history...pitched a scoreless 18th inning of the 3-2 Dodgers victory in 2018 Game 3 vs the Red Sox.
- In Game 4 of the 2017 World Series vs the Astros at Minute Maid Park threw 5.2 innings before he allowed a hit, the longest no-hit bid by a Dodgers pitcher in World Series history...received no decision in that 6-2 Dodgers win (5.2ip, 1h, 1er, 2bb, 3k, 1hr).
- In his career is 47-38, 3.33 in 129 starts and 5-2, 2.70 in 43 relief apps.

2018 SEASON

- Led the Dodgers with 27 starts (8-7, 3.65), all in his first 27 apps of the season.
- Beginning 9/17 made his last 6 apps in relief (1-0, 4.91).
- Went 1-1, 5.40 in 9 Postseason apps (6.2ip, 8h, 4er, 4bb, 9k, 3hr)...pitched in the Division Series vs the Braves (2g), in the League Championship Series vs the Brewers (4g) and in 3 of the Dodgers' 5 World Series games vs the Red Sox.
- Was the winning pitcher in the longest game by innings and by time in World Series history (18 innings & 7 hours, 20 minutes)...in Game 3 vs the Red Sox at Dodger Stadium, as LAD's ninth pitcher of the game threw a scoreless 18th inning to earn that 3-2 win...Max Muncy won it for the Dodgers in the bottom of the 18th on a solo walkoff HR off Nathan Eovaldi, who as the Red Sox' ninth pitcher allowed 3 hits and 2 runs in 6.0 innings in relief.

2017: Was a National League All-Star and finished ninth in the Baseball Writers' Association of America's National League Cy Young Award after recording a career-high 16 wins and career-low 2.72 ERA...began the season 11-0, 1.56 through his first 16 apps, including 14 starts...earned his spot on the All-Star team after finishing the first half of the season 10-0, 1.67 in 13 starts and 2 relief apps...became the 19th Major League pitcher since 1913 to begin a season 11-0 or better (Wsh's Stephen Strasburg went 13-0 to begin the 2016 campaign)...his 11-game winning streak was the second-longest in the majors in 2018, trailing only teammate Clayton Kershaw's 12-game winning streak...from 4/10-7/15 made 14 consecutive starts without a loss (10-0, 1.66), the longest streak by a Dodgers pitcher since Rick Rhoden went 19 straight starts without a loss in 1976...in 6 starts on the road from 4/26-8/3 went 5-0, 0.71 and allowed 0 or 1 earned run in each...was the longest such road streak in Dodgers history since 1913...only 3 other pitchers in the previous 20 years had allowed 0 or 1 earned run in 6 straight road starts, including Johan Santana (7gs, 2004), Ubaldo Jimenez (7gs, 2010) and Luis Severino (6gs, 2017) ...was named National League Pitcher of the Month for May (5gs, 5-0, 1.27, 28.1ip, 22h, 7bb, 41k).

2016: Missed 98 games because an impingement in his left elbow that led to arthroscopic surgery on 7/20.

2015: In 32 starts for the Braves and Dodgers went 12-12, 3.84...on 7/30 was acquired by the Dodgers in a 14-player trade that also involved the Marlins... produced one of the best starts of his career in a 2-0 win on 9/16 vs Col, when he threw just 78 pitches in 8.0 shutout innings (1h, 0bb, 5k).

2014: Went 8-10, 2.59 in his 24 starts and 3-1, 4.70 in 11 relief apps...averaged 3.15 runs in support, the third-lowest mark in the National League...began the season with a 3.00 ERA in his first 7 starts but posted a 2-5 record despite allowing 2 runs or fewer in 6 of those apps...from 5/9-6/8 made all 11 of his relief apps... on 6/25 at Hou returned to the rotation, after Gavin Floyd suffered a fractured elbow, and threw 7.0 scoreless innings in the 4-0 win (3h, 1bb, 4k)...finished the season in the Braves' rotation and went 6-5, 2.43 over his last 17 apps.

2013: Was an MiLB.com Braves Organization All-Star and the Southern League Pitcher of the Week for 4/23-4/29...in his Major League debut went 3-3, 3.13 in 11 starts and 20 relief apps for the Braves...was promoted on 5/30 and later in that day's 11-3 win vs the Blue Jays made his Major League debut with a scoreless inning in relief (1h)...made his first career start in his seventh appearance, a 4-3 loss on 6/18 vs NYM (3ip, 2h, 1er, 3bb, 5k)...earned his first career victory on 7/30 vs Col, started the 11-3 victory (7ip, 6h, 3er, 1bb, 7k, 1hr)... prior to his promotion, over 7 minor league starts from 4/12-5/14 threw 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings, a Mississippi Braves record...entered the season rated by *Baseball America* the player closest to the Major Leagues from the Braves' 2012 draft class and the seventh-best prospect in the organization overall.
