LAST SEASON:

2017 SEASON: Was named to the American League All-Star team for the first time in his career after being elected by the fans as the starting designated hitter...Established career highs in games, runs, hits, extra base hits (64), home runs, total bases (288) and multi-hit games (51)...Led Tampa Bay in runs, hits, extra base hits, total bases and multi-hit games...Hit six leadoff home runs; tied for third in the Majors behind Houston's George Springer (nine) and Minnesota's Brian Dozier (eight)...His six leadoff home runs were a club single-season-high, ahead of Rocco Baldelli's five in 2006...Hit three leadoff home runs within the Rays' first 21 games; the fastest in club history to do that... Hit a leadoff home run five times as the designated hitter; the only other instance of that in the Majors in 2017 was Cleveland's Francisco Lindor (it only occurred three times in club history from 1998-2016)...Hit 15 home runs out of the leadoff spot; the third-most in a single season in club history behind Gerald Williams (21) in 2000 and Logan Forsythe (20) in 2016...Hit .312 (107-for-343) with 17 home runs and 42 RBI in 85 games before the break and .241 (59-for-245) with 10 home runs and 20 RBI after the break...Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster and third straight Opening Day start (led off and was the designated hitter)...Was the American League's outright leader in average (.330) through 6/26; the latest into a season by date that a Ray led the A.L. batting race, surpassing Jason Bartlett, who led the A.L. thru 6/6/09...Recorded at least four hits five times; a number reached by only two players in team history - Carl Crawford (eight in 2010, five in 2007 and five in 2004) and Randy Winn

(five in 2002); Jose Abreu was the only player in the Majors to record more games with four hits or more (seven)...Hit .351 (33-for-94) vs. lefties through 6/23; the highest mark in the Majors by a left-handed hitter...Became the second player in team history to hit a leadoff home run on his birthday on 5/22; joining Randy Winn on 6/9/02...Reached base safely in 26 consecutive road games from 4/12 to 6/3; the longest streak by a Ray since Evan Longoria's club record of 38 games (2012-13)...Recorded a Major League-leading 44 hits in May, a club record for the month and the most by a Ray in any calendar month since Carl Crawford had 50 in August of 2007...Reached 100 hits in the team's 79th game; tying Carl Crawford (2009) for the second-fastest in club history to get there (Crawford was also the only player to do it faster in 2004 - 77th game)...Collected 107 hits before the All-Star break; the most by a Ray since Carl Crawford had 109 in 2009 and three shy of Crawford's club record (2004)...Entered the All-Star break tied with Houston's Carlos Correa and George Springer for the American League lead with 33 multi-hit games...Became the fourth Ray to start an All-Star Game; with the previous three coming in 2010 (Evan Longoria at third base, Carl Crawford in left field and David Price at pitcher); Evan Longoria (2009) and DH Jose Canseco (1999) were also elected starters but did not play...Snapped an 0-for-21 streak overall and an 0-for-34 streak at Tropicana Field with a go-ahead, three-run homer in the eighth inning on 8/10 vs. Cleveland; was his second go-ahead homer in the eighth inning or later; the first was exactly three years prior on 8/10/14 at Arizona.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

2016: Spent first season with Tampa Bay while establishing a career high in doubles...Made 69 starts in left field, 61 as the designated hitter and one in right field...Had 63 of his 125 hits (50.4%) go for extra bases; the second-highest ratio in the American League behind Boston's David Ortiz (87 of 169, 51.5%); was also the highest mark by a Ray since Carlos Pena in 2009 (61.9)...Recorded a club record 22 doubles after the All-Star break, which ranked fourth in the American League...Ranked sixth in the American League with 34 extra base hits in the second half... Was hitting .198 as late as 6/20...Hit .326 with eight doubles, six homers and 16 RBI over his final 24 games beginning on 9/7...Hit 22 of his 24 homers (91.7%) off right-handed pitchers; the second-highest rate in Rays history (minimum 20 homers) behind Eric Hinske (19-of-20, 95.0%) in 2008...Hit 17 of his 24 homers on the road (70.8%); the highest percentage in the Majors...Became the first Tampa player to homer on Opening Day in his Rays debut since Eric Hinske in 2008...Connected off Taijuan Walker for first career grand slam on 5/9 at Seattle...Went 3-for-4 with a triple, homer and three RBI, including the game-winning single in the seventh inning; also became the first Ray to homer off the D-ring catwalk since Carlos Pena on 7/29/10 vs. Detroit...Went 6-for-11 with four runs scored in his return to Coors Field from 7/18-20... Was part of back-to-back-to-back homers on 9/21 vs. New York (AL), following Evan Longoria and Brad Miller against Masahiro Tanaka; it was the third occurrence in Rays history and the first 6/24/13 vs. Toronto (James Loney, Wil Myers and Sam Fuld).

2015: Was limited to 65 games during his final season with Colorado...Made three trips to the disabled list...Was sidelined

twice due to plantar fasciitis in his left foot (5/19 to 6/10 and 6/17 to 7/23)...Was also on the disabled list with two fractured ribs from 8/1 to 9/7...Was Colorado's Opening Day starter in left field; his first career Opening Day start...Went 2-for-5 with a career-high tying four RBI; hit a two-run homer in the first inning off Kyle Lohse and a two-run double in the fourth inning in a 10-0 win to become the fourth Rockies to homer in the first inning on Opening Day and the first since Ian Stewart on 4/5/10 at Milwaukee...Hit .329 (25-for-76) with four doubles, five homers and 15 RBI in 21 games in April...Sustained two fractured ribs on 7/30 at St. Louis diving in left field for a ball hit by Jason Heyward, who he still managed to catch in a rundown between third base and home... Was placed on the disabled list two days later with two non-displaced fractures and was reinstated on 9/8...Recorded 10 extra base hits in his last 10 games.

2014: Spent his first full season in the big leagues with Colorado... Led the Rockies in home runs and extra base hits (57) and was second on the team in RBI...Finished 24 plate appearances shy of qualifying for the National League batting title...Among National League players with as many plate appearances, he ranked first in slugging percentage and fourth in average and OPS (.931)... Was named Colorado's recipient of the MLB Alumni Association's Heart and Hustle Award, which honors active players who demonstrate a passion for baseball and best embody the values, spirit and tradition of the game...Made his first Opening Day roster and spent all but seven days (4/7-13 with Colorado Springs) in the Majors...Emergued as the starting left fielder in June after injuries to All-Stars Carlos Gonzalez and Michael Cuddyer (when Gonzalez

returned in July, Dickerson, batting .325, remained in left field and Gonzalez moved to right)...Earned his first Player-of-the-Week honors for the week of 8/11-17 after hitting .393 (11-for-28) with four doubles, three homers, 11 RBI and six runs scored...Hit his 20th homer of the season on 8/27 at San Francisco (the 100th ever hit into McCovey Cove); was a leadoff homer in the fifth inning and the first hit allowed by Tim Hudson that night.

2013: Appeared in 69 games over two stints (6/21 to 7/10 and 7/26 until the end of the season) with Colorado...Made a total of

42 starts (28 in left field, 12 in center field, one in right field and one as the designated hitter)...Made Major League debut on 6/22 at Washington and went 2-for-4 with two doubles and an RBI in a 7-1 win...Delivered an RBI double off Dan Haren in his first career plate appearance then doubled off Haren again in his next at bat... Hit first career homer in a 6-5 win on 7/28 vs. Milwaukee; a solo shot off Donovan Hand...Led the Pacific Coast League in slugging percentage while also being named to the league's post-season All-Star team.

MINOR LEAGUE HIGHLIGHTS:

2012: Hit a combined .304 (154-for-506) while splitting the season between Class-A Modesto and Double-A Tulsa... Recorded 69 extra base hits; tied for the third-most along with Omaha's Wil Myers among all minor leaguers...Began the season with a 14-game hitting streak with Modesto...Was selected to the California League mid-season All-Star team, but did not play due to his promotion to Tulsa on 6/9...Hit .364 (24-for-66) in 17 games for the Salt River Rafters in the Arizona Fall League while being named to the league's Rising Stars team.

2011: Spent first full professional season with Asheville...Led the South Atlantic League in home runs, which was tied for fourth in all of minor league baseball...Led the South Atlantic League

in slugging percentage, which ranked fourth in all of minor league baseball...Ranked second in the South Atlantic League in extra base hits (64) and third in RBI...Hit three home runs and collected 10 RBI on 6/3 vs. Augusta...His 10 RBI tied the South Atlantic League record set 33 years prior by Asheville's James Barbe in 1978.

2010: Made professional debut with rookie level Casper while being named to the Pioneer League All-Star team...Led the league in RBI, extra base hits (44) and total bases (175), ranked second in doubles, triples and slugging percentage, third in home runs and hits and sixth in average.

PERSONAL:

PERSONAL: McKenzie Corey Dickerson...Wife's name is Beth Anne...Has two sons; son Davis (10/1/14) and Miller (2/22/18), who was born the same day he was acquired by the Pirates... Learned of their second child during the same series his All-Star selection was announced...He came back from a game to the team hotel and his son Davis opened the door to greet him and said that he was going to be a big brother...He shared the news with the rest of his family at the All-Star Game in Miami... Played basketball and football at Brookhaven (MS) Academy, where he won three state championships in basketball in his four years there...Tore his labrum at a baseball camp during his junior year, forcing a move from shortstop to the outfield, as well as a move from quarterback to wide receiver...Played two seasons at Meridian (MS) Community College...Was committed

to transfer to Mississippi State when he signed with the Rockies in 2010...Recently purchased a home in Madison, MS, where they expect to live after baseball so their children can be close to their grandparents...Rather than play travel ball as a kid, he honed his swing with his older brother Craig, where they built their own pitcher's mound and competed hitting ping-pong balls with a broomstick...Grew up an Atlanta Braves fan, and Hall-of-Famer Chipper Jones was among the factors in choosing No. 10 with the Rays...Had his college jersey No. 23 retired in a ceremony this past February...His high school jersey No. 3 is also retired...He met his wife for the first time at freshman orientation at Meridian College, and his mother-in-law is the dean of students of the nursing program at the school.
