WILD THINGS: The Yankees will play in the postseason for the 54th time in the franchise's 116-year history...have qualified for the postseason in 20 of the last 24 seasons since 1995 (missed in 2008, '13-14, '16).

- ▶ Marks their seventh AL Wild Card berth (1995, '97, 2007, '10, '15, '17-18) and their third appearance in the AL Wild Card Game (lost in 2015 vs. Houston, won in 2017 vs. Minnesota, both at home)...will match Pittsburgh (1-2 in NLWCG from 2013-15, all at home) for the most total appearances by a team in the Wild Card Game...Colorado (1-1 in 2017-18) is the only team other than the Yankees and Pirates to play in the Wild Card Game in consecutive years.
- ▶ Join the Pirates as the only teams to have ever hosted multiple Wild Card Games...home teams are 5-7 all-time in the Wild Card Game (AL 3-3, NL 2-4).
- ▶ The Yankees' and A's' 197 combined regular season wins are the most ever in a Wild Card Game, surpassing the 2015 Pirates (98) and Cubs (97), who combined for 195.
- ▶ Have won all three of their prior postseason series vs. Oakland, going 9-4 in 13 postseason games (3-2 in the 2001 ALDS, 3-2 in the 2000 ALDS, and 3-0 in the 1981 ALCS).

THE HUNDREDS: With a 100-62 (.617) mark, the Yankees recorded the 20th 100-win season in franchise history...are responsible for 20 of the 104 seasons in which a Major League team reached 100 wins...marks their highest win total since going 103-59 in 2009.

- ▶ Was the third-best record in the Majors (and AL) despite finishing second in the AL East...with Boston (108-54, .667) and Houston (103-59, .636), **marked the first time in Major League history that one league had three 100-win teams.**
- ▶ Are just the second 100-win Wild Card team in the Wild Card era (since 1994), joining the 2001 Oakland Athletics (102-60)...are the first 100-win team to play in a Wild Card Game...are one of four teams in the Division Era (since 1969) to win at least 100 games and not win their division, joining the 2001 A's (102-60), 1993 San Francisco Giants (103-59) and 1980 Baltimore Orioles (100-62).

MANAGING WELL: Manager Aaron Boone in 2018 became the **fourth Yankees manager to lead the team to a postseason berth in his rookie managerial season**, joining Ralph Houk in 1961 (won World Series), Yogi Berra in 1964 (lost WS) and Dick Howser in 1980 (lost ALCS).

- ▶ **Became the sixth manager in Baseball history to lead his team to at least 100 wins in his rookie season**, joining Ralph Houk (1961 Yankees, 109-53), Alex Cora (2018 Red Sox, 108-54), Dusty Baker (1993 Giants, 103-59), Sparky Anderson (1970 Reds, 102-60) and Mickey Cochrane (1934 Tigers, 101-53).

HEAVYWEIGHT MATCHUPS: Among the AL's five postseason qualifiers, the Yankees had the best record against the other four teams, going 22-17 (5-2 vs. Cleveland, 5-2 vs. Houston, 3-3 vs. Oakland, 9-10 vs. Boston).

- ▶ Went 13-5 at home vs. AL playoff teams (2-1 vs. Oakland, 6-3 vs. Boston, 3-0 vs. Cleveland, 2-1 vs. Houston).
- ▶ The Yankees went a Major League-best 41-30 (.577) against teams that finished with records of .500-or-better...was their best such mark since 2009 (52-35, .598).

ROOKIE MOVES: 3B Miguel Andújar **tied the AL rookie single-season record with 47 doubles** (also Boston's Fred Lynn in 1975)...tied for second-most by any rookie, trailing only Brooklyn's Johnny Frederick (52 in 1929)...surpassed Joe DiMaggio (45 in 1936) for the Yankees rookie record...tied for the seventh-highest doubles total in Yankees history.

- ▶ His 76XBH led all 2018 rookies and were third-most by a rookie in Yankees history behind DiMaggio (88 in 1936) and Aaron Judge (79 in 2017).
- ▶ Became the first rookie third baseman in Major League history (min. 50% of games at 3B) with at least 40 doubles and 25HR in his rookie season.
- ▶ At age 21y, 294d today, **INF Gleyber Torres will be just the third Yankee since 1958 to appear in a postseason game at age 21-or-younger** (Jesús Montero at age 21y, 310d in ALDS Game 4 on 10/4/11; Phil Hughes at age 21y, 105d in ALDS Game 3 on 10/7/07)...will be the **youngest position player to appear in a postseason game for the Yankees since Tom Carroll** (age 19y, 15d) in World Series Game 5 on 10/2/55.

FAN FAVORITES: The Yankees (3,482,865 total / 42,998 per game) ranked second in the Majors in total and average attendance in 2018 to the Dodgers (3,857,500 / 47,043).

- ▶ Drew 3 million fans for the MLB-record 20th straight year.

BRONX BOMBERS: Yankees batters **broke the single-season Major League home run record with 267 home runs in 2018**, surpassing the 1997 Mariners (264HR)...also broke the Yankees' previous record of 245HR in 2012.

- ▶ Homered in 131-of-162 games (80.1%), tying the Major League record (2012 Yankees)...had 78 multi-HR games, tying the Major League record (Texas in 2005, Seattle in 1997)...hit at least 3HR in 37 games, the most in Yankees history (prev. 33 in 2004) and fifth-most in Major League history...hit at least 4HR in a franchise-record 16 games (prev. 14 in 2005 and '17), tied for second-most in Major League history.
- ▶ Led the Majors in home runs in July (37), August (53) and September (46).
- ▶ Hit a Yankees-record 144HR at home (81G), tied for the fifth-highest home HR total in Major League history...hit 123HR on the road, second-most in the Majors (Oakland-136HR) and the third-highest total in franchise history (128HR in 1961, 124HR in 2003).
- ▶ According to *Elias*, became the **first team in Major League history to hit at least 20HR from all nine batting spots.**

TATER TROTS: The Yankees were **the first team in Major League history to have 12 players hit at least 10HR in the same season**...five teams have had 11 players reach double-digit home runs: Detroit in 2004, Houston in 2015 and 2017, Minnesota in 2016 and Toronto in 2018.

- ▶ Had five players with at least 25HR, matching the franchise record (also 2009).

MULTI-TASKING: Yankees batters **tied a Major League record with 24 individual multi-HR games**, joining the 1961 Yankees and 1966 Atlanta Braves.

- ▶ Had 10 different players record a multi-HR game: Gregorius (5), Stanton (4), Sánchez (3), Austin/Gardner/Hicks/Torres/Voit (2), Bird/Walker (1)...not included was Aaron Judge, who led the AL with seven multi-HR games in 2017.

STANTON ISLAND: In his first season as a Yankee, **OF Giancarlo Stanton** tied for sixth in the Majors with 38HR, ranked seventh in the AL with 100RBI and tied for seventh in the AL with 102R...was the 12th player in franchise history to reach 38HR, 100RBI and 100R in a single season...was just the fourth to reach those totals *in his first season with the club*, joining Mark Teixeira in 2009 (39HR, 122RBI, 103R), Jason Giambi in 2002 (41HR, 122RBI, 120R) and Babe Ruth in 1920 (54HR, 136RBI, 158R)...his 38HR were the fifth-most by a player in his first season as a Yankee, behind Ruth, Giambi, Teixeira and Roger Maris (39HR in 1960).

- ▶ **His 1,144 career regular season games ranked second-most among active players who had never reached the postseason prior to 2018**, behind Seattle's Kyle Seager (1155G)...his 305 regular season home runs led that group, 112 more than Oakland's Khris Davis (193HR).
- ▶ Is the Yankees' nominee for the 2018 Hank Aaron Award, given annually to the best offensive player in each league...won the award in both 2014 and '17 with Miami...fans can vote for Stanton at MLB.com through Mon., 10/8.

HOT HAND LUKE: 1B Luke Voit finished the reg. season with RBI in each of his last 5G and nine of his last 11G, hitting .419/.468/.977 (18-for-43) with 12R, 3 doubles, 7HR, 16RBI and 4BB over the longer stretch...was named **AL "Player of the Week"** for the final week of the reg. season (9/24-30) after batting .458/.519/.958 (11-for-24) with 5R, 3 doubles, 3HR, 8RBI and 3BB in 6G.

- ▶ Since 8/24, his 14HR and 1.190 OPS (in 32G) were second in the Majors, trailing only Christian Yelich (15HR, 1.316 OPS).
- ▶ Made his Yankees debut on 8/2 and hit .333/.405/.689 (44-for-132) with 28R, 5 doubles, 14HR, 33RBI and 15BB in 39G...his 1.095 OPS was the third-highest by Yankee in a single season since 1962 (min. 100AB), trailing Oscar Gamble (1.187 in 1979) and Glenallen Hill (1.112 in 2000).
- ▶ According to *Elias*, joins Colorado's Nolan Arenado as the first players to enter a postseason having homered in each of their last three regular season games since Philadelphia's Ryan Howard in 2007.

SEVY LIFTING: RHP Luis Severino will make his fifth career postseason start tonight...only two other pitchers in Yankees history have made five postseason starts prior to turning 25 years old: Andy Pettitte (6) and Waite Hoyt (5).

BEEN HERE BEFORE: OF Andrew McCutchen and INF Neil Walker are tied for the most Wild Card games in Major League history with 3G (both with Pittsburgh from 2013-15).

- ▶ McCutchen is 4-for-10 (.400) with 1R and 3BB in those 3G, the all-time Wild Card leader in times on base (seven)...is tied for the second-most hits behind Trevor Story (5H).

TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 3, 2012: With a 4HR performance in the season finale vs. Boston, the Yankees set a single-season franchise record with 245HR.

Oct. 3, 2006: Derek Jeter goes 5-for-5 with 2 doubles and a home run during the Yankees' 8-4 win over Detroit in Game 1 of the ALDS. Jeter is one of three players in MLB history to go 5-for-5 in a postseason game (also Carl Crawford and Marquis Grissom).

Oct. 3, 1978: Reggie Jackson hits a three-run homer and Jim Beattie (5.1IP) combines with Ken Clay (3.2IP) to allow only two hits during the Yankees' 7-1 win over the Royals in Game 1 of the ALCS.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 4, 2009: Alex Rodriguez hits a grand slam and a three-run home run in the top of the sixth inning at Tampa Bay. His 7RBI marks an AL record, as he becomes only the second player since 1900 to drive in at least seven runs in an inning (also Fernando Tatís, 8RBI on 4/23/99 vs. LAD).

Oct. 4, 1995: The Yankees take a 2-games-to-none lead over the Mariners in the ALDS when Jim Leyritz belts a two-run, "walk-off" home run in the 15th inning. New York hits four homers in the game and Mariano Rivera earns the win (3.1IP, 2H, 0R, 5K).

Oct. 4, 1953: Mickey Mantle hits a grand slam and three other Yankees homer during an 11-7 win over the Dodgers at Ebbets Field in Game 5 of the World Series, giving New York a 3-games-to-2 lead.

Oct. 4, 1939: The Yankees begin their World Series title run with a 2-1, "walk-off" victory over the Reds in Game 1. Charlie Keller triples and scores the winning run on a Bill Dickey single, while Red Ruffing allows four hits in his complete-game effort.

YANKEES vs. OAKLAND

OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS: The Yankees went 3-3 vs. the Athletics in 2018...are 3-7 in the last 10G vs. the A's...are 17-29 in their last 46 meetings (since 7/19/12)...had gone 30-7 in the previous 37 matchups prior to that stretch from 6/10/08-5/27/12... **IN SEASON SERIES:** Have won just one of the last six season series with the A's (4-3 in 2016)...are 5-4-2 vs. Oakland over the last 11 season series (since 2008)... **AT YANKEE STADIUM:** Went 2-1 at Yankee Stadium in the regular season...are 8-11 vs. Oakland at the current Yankee Stadium since 9/23/12 and 22-15 since its opening in 2009... **IN POSTSEASON:** The Yankees have won all three postseason series against the A's (2001 ALDS, 3-2; 2000 ALDS, 3-2; and 1981 ALCS, 3-0).

TONIGHT'S STARTING PITCHER: RHP LUIS SEVERINO (19-8, 3.39 ERA)

RHP Luis Severino will make his fifth career postseason start in tonight's "winner-take-all" AL Wild Card Game vs. Oakland...the 24-year-old will start on extended eight days' rest...went 19-8 with a 3.39 ERA (191.1IP, 72ER) in 32 regular season starts in 2018...finished with a **career-high 19 wins**, which were third-most in the Majors behind Blake Snell (21) and Corey Kluber (20)...was eighth in the AL and 13th in the Majors with 220K...is one of three pitchers in Yankees history with multiple 200-strikeout seasons (also David Cone, 1997-98 and Ron Guidry, 1978-79)...on 7/23 at Tampa Bay, became just the third Yankees pitcher to reach 500K prior to his 25th birthday...the Yankees went 24-8 in his regular season starts this season, tied for most team wins by one pitcher in 2018...was named to his second career All-Star Game in 2018 and tossed a scoreless second inning (1H, 2K)...finished third in 2017 AL Cy Young Award voting after posting a 14-6 record and 2.98 ERA (193.1IP, 64ER) in 31 starts...was originally signed by the Yankees as a non-drafted free agent on 12/26/11.

LAST START: Won his 19th game of the season on 9/24 at Tampa Bay (5.0IP, 4H, 2ER, 3BB, 7K, 1HP)...did not allow a home run in his last four starts, which was tied for the longest streak of his career (fifth time, last on 5/2-19/18)...held Tampa Bay batters to 1-for-6 with RISP...allowed both runs to score on a Brandon Lowe double in the third.

THIRTY-SOMETHING: Made a career-high 32 starts this season (previously 31 starts in 2017)...was the first pitcher to have multiple 30-start seasons in his age-24 seasons or younger since Julio Teheran and Shelby Miller did so from 2013-15.

THE WIN IS IN: Finished third in the Majors with 19 wins this season, trailing Blake Snell (21-5) and Corey Kluber (20-7)...tied for the most wins in a season by a Yankees pitcher since CC Sabathia went 19-8 in 2011...the last Yankees pitcher to win 20 games was CC Sabathia in 2010 (21-7)...were the **second-most wins by a Yankees pitcher, age-24-or-younger, in the last 50 seasons** (since 1969), behind Andy Pettitte (21-8 in 1996)...are the most wins by any pitcher in his age-24 season or younger in the last seven years (since 2012), tied with Pittsburgh's Gerrit Cole (19-8 in 2015)...was the first AL pitcher in his age-24 season or younger to win 19 games since 2010 (David Price-19-6).

- ✦ The Yankees went 24-8 in his 32 regular season starts, **tied for the most team wins started by one pitcher in 2018** (also Jon Lester, Gerrit Cole and Miles Mikolas)...were the most Yankees wins started by one pitcher in a season since the Yankees went 27-5 in 33 Roger Clemens' starts in 2001...the Yankees won 10 straight Severino starts from 4/16-6/4 and were 16-1 from 4/16-7/12.
- ✦ Went 2-1 with a 2.04 ERA (17.2IP, 4ER) in his last three regular season starts...has won back-to-back starts.

FALL BALL: Will be making his fifth postseason start, after going 1-1 with a 5.63 ERA (16.0IP, 10ER) in four postseason starts, in 2017...is one of two pitchers in Yankees history to start four postseason games prior to turning 24 years old (Waite Hoyt, 4GS)...started two potential elimination games at age-23; only two other such games in Yankees history were started by pitchers 23-or-younger: Mel Stottlemyre (22 years, 337 days in 1964 WS Game 7 at St. Louis) and Waite Hoyt (22 years, 34 days in 1921 WS Game 8 vs. New York Giants).

- ✦ Will be making his second straight AL Wild Card start...is one of three pitchers to start multiple Wild Card games with San Francisco's Madison Bumgarner and Chicago-NL's Jon Lester...is one of four Yankees pitchers to start a "winner-take-all" postseason game prior to turning 25 years old, and the only Yankees pitcher to start two such games (also Iván Nova-2011 ALDS Game 5, Mel Stottlemyre-1964 World Series Game 7 and Johnny Kucks-1956 World Series Game 7).
- ✦ Made his postseason debut in the 2017 AL Wild Card Game vs. Minnesota (ND, 0.1IP, 3ER), matching the shortest start by a Yankees pitcher in postseason history (also Art Ditmar in 1960 WS Game 1 at Pittsburgh and Bob Turley in 1958 WS Game 2 at Milwaukee)...at 23 years, 225 days old, was the youngest Yankee to start a postseason game since Andy Pettitte (23.111) in 1995 ALDS Game 2 vs. Seattle.
- ✦ With 9K in 2017 ALDS Game 4 vs. Cleveland, was the second-youngest Yankee (23 years, 231 days) to record 9K in a postseason game, behind Dave Righetti (22 years, 314 days for 1981 ALDS Game 2 at Milwaukee-10K).

VS. OAKLAND: Is 1-1 with a 5.23 ERA (20.2IP, 12ER) in four career regular season starts against Oakland...started twice vs. the A's this season, going 1-1 with a 6.23 ERA (8.2IP, 6ER).

- ✦ In two career starts vs. Oakland at Yankee Stadium, is 1-0 with a 2.25 ERA (12.0IP, 3ER)...has thrown 6.0IP and allowed 2R-or-fewer in each of those starts...in his start vs. the A's at the Stadium on 5/13/18, threw 6.0IP and allowed 1ER on 5H to earn the win.

STRIKEOUT MACHINE: Finished 13th in the Majors and eighth in the AL with 220K...was one of three pitchers in Yankees history with multiple 200-strikeout seasons (also David Cone, 1997-98 and Ron Guidry, 1978-79).

- ✦ **Has 450K over the last two seasons (2017-18), the highest total over a two-season span in Yankees history** (Ron Guidry previously held the record with 449K in 1978-79).
- ✦ His 220K are the sixth-most by a Yankees pitcher in a single season (see chart to the right).
- ✦ Became the fifth pitcher in Yankees history to record at least 10K with OBB three times in a single season, joining Mike Mussina (4 in 2001), David Cone (3 in 1998), Masahiro Tanaka (3 in 2017) and David Wells (3 in 1998).
- ✦ Has five double-digit strikeout games this season, tied for the 10th-most by a Yankee in a single season, and most since CC Sabathia had six in 2012.

2018: Finished seventh (fourth in the AL) among Major League pitchers with a 5.7 WAR (FanGraphs)...ranked fourth in the AL with a 4.78 K/BB ratio and seventh with a 10.35 K/9.0IP ratio.

- ✦ Tied for sixth in the AL in starts and ranked ninth in the AL in ERA...was sixth among qualified AL pitchers with a 2.95 FIP (FanGraphs).
- ✦ Led Major League starters with an average fastball velocity of 97.6 mph (FanGraphs)...per Statcast, threw 50 pitches in the sixth inning or later that registered at 99.0 mph-or-faster, the most by a starter in the Majors (Chris Sale was second with 16)...threw first-pitch strikes to 68.9 percent of batters, the highest mark in the AL and third-highest in the Majors...opponents hit .191 (56-for-293) with 11BB, 119K and 6HR in ABs ending in a slider (Brooks Baseball).
- ✦ Led the Majors in wins before the All-Star break, going 14-2 with a 2.31 ERA (128.1IP, 33ER) in 20 starts...was the fourth pitcher in franchise history to record at least 14 wins prior to the All-Star break, joining Mel Stottlemyre (14-7 in 24GS in 1969), Whitey Ford (16-2 in 21GS in 1961) and Lefty Gomez (14-2 in 19G/17GS in 1934)...was only the fourth Major League pitcher in the last 16 seasons (since 2003) to record at least 14 wins prior to the All-Star break, joining Los Angeles-NL's Clayton Kershaw (14-2 in 19GS in 2017), Chicago-AL's Chris Sale (14-3 in 18GS in 2016) and Colorado's Ubaldo Jimenez (15-1 in 18GS in 2010)...went just 5-6 with a 5.57 ERA (63.0IP, 39ER) in 12 starts after the break.
- ✦ Opponents hit .191 (56-for-293) with 11BB, 119K and 6HR in ABs ending in a slider (Brooks Baseball).

WELCOME TO MY HOUSE: Went 10-2 with a 2.74 ERA (92.0IP, 28ER) in 15 starts at Yankee Stadium...was one of seven pitchers with at least 10 home wins in 2018...became the fourth pitcher to earn at least 10 wins in a season at the current Yankee Stadium, joining CC Sabathia (11-2 in 2010, 10-5 in 2013), Phil Hughes (11-4 in 2010, 11-4 in 2012) and Hiroki Kuroda (11-6 in 2012).

- In four career postseason starts (three in 2017, one in 2015), is 2-2 with a 1.44 ERA (25.0IP, 14H, 4ER, 6BB, 21K, 2HR)...is the second-lowest postseason ERA in Yankees history among pitchers with at least four postseason starts, behind Monte Pearson (1.01)...was the second Yankee to record two scoreless starts of at least 7.0IP within his first four career postseason appearances (also Orlando Hernandez in 1998-99)...according to *Elias*, is one of two pitchers all-time to allow 4H-or-fewer and 2R-or-fewer in each of his first four postseason starts, joining Oakland's Blue Moon Odom in 1972...is 2-1 with a 0.95 ERA (19.0IP, 2ER) in three career postseason appearances at Yankee Stadium.
- Went 12-6 with a 3.75 ERA (156.0IP, 141H, 68R/65ER, 35BB, 159K, 25HR) and one complete game in 27 starts with the Yankees in 2018...in 12GS after the All-Star break, went 5-4 with a 2.85 ERA (72.2IP, 23ER), the AL's seventh-lowest ERA (min. 50.0IP).
- Had the two longest scoreless streaks of his career: 21.1IP from 7/15-8/5 and 20.0IP from 9/1-14...*Elias* confirmed that he is the first Yankee pitcher to record multiple scoreless streaks of at least 20.0IP in a single season since Ron Guidry in 1983 (22.2IP, 5/11-22/83; 21.1IP, 5/27-6/6/83).
- All of his 132 career appearances have been starts.
- In five career starts vs. the A's, has gone 3-2 with a 2.53 ERA (32.0IP, 9ER) with 37K... has tossed at least 6.0IP and allowed 1ER-or-fewer in four of those five starts.
- Was acquired by the Yankees via the posting system from the Rakuten Eagles of Japan and signed to a seven-year contract on January 22, 2014...contract extends through 2020...declined to exercise his opt-out clause following 2017.
