



2015 SEASON REVIEW

A QUICK OVERVIEW: The Padres finished the 2015 campaign with a record of 74-88, slotting them in fourth place in the National League West Division, 18.0 games back of the first place Dodgers and 23.0 games short of a wild card berth.

- The Padres were 35-41 vs. the NL West, 15-18 vs. the NL Central, 17-16 vs. the NL East and 7-13 against the American League in interleague play.

PACKING PETCO: The Padres drew **2,459,742** fans to Petco Park in 2015, the **seventh-highest home season attendance in franchise history** and the **fifth-largest since moving into their downtown ballpark in 2004**.

- Their 2015 attendance total was their largest since drawing 2,790,074 fans to Petco Park during the 2007 season.
- The 2,459,742 fans to attend a game at Petco Park in 2015 was a 264,369 increase over the 2014 total of 2,195,373...the average attendance during the 2015 season at Petco Park was 30,367, a 3,264 person per game increase over last year's average of 27,103.
- The Padres increase in attendance this season was the sixth-highest in Major League Baseball and third-highest in the National League.

TRANSACTION-PALOOZA: The Padres opened the 2015 season with 15 players on the Opening Day 25-man roster that were not on the roster to start the 2014 season...this list includes six pitchers (Despaigne, Garcés, Kelley, Kimbrel, Morrow and Shields), two catchers (Nieves and Norris), four infielders (Barnes, Middlebrooks, Solarte and Spangenberg) and three outfielders (Kemp, Myers and Upton).

- From the end of the 2014 season until Opening Day 2015, the club made 10 trades involving 38 players (coming and going) and made four 40-man free-agent signings.
- In a 24-hour window between December 18-19, the Padres made a total of 30 transactions (trades, signings, DFA's, minor league moves, etc.) which, since data became available, **is the most ever by a Major League club in a 24-hour stretch**.
- In the season opener against the Dodgers on April 6, San Diego had eight different players make their Padres debut (Myers, Norris, Kemp, Upton, Middlebrooks, Barnes, Shields and Kelley), the second-highest number of team debuts in the same game in franchise history, trailing only March 31, 2011 (Opening Day) when the Friars had nine players make their team debut.

MAKING PITCHERS UNKEMP'D: Matt Kemp posted a .265/.312/.443 (158-for-596) with 31 doubles, 23 home runs and 100 RBI in 154 games with San Diego this season.

- Kemp was the 14th different player (19th time) in franchise history to record 100+ RBI in a single season and the first since Chase Headley drove in 115 runs during the 2012 campaign... Kemp was also one of 13 Major Leaguers and one of four National League players to reach the 100 RBI plateau this season.
- His RBI total ranked 13th in the Majors and fourth in the NL.
- Among players in franchise history to play 75% or more of their games in a single season in the outfield, Kemp was the sixth player in franchise history to record 100+ RBI in a single season and the first since Greg Vaughn had 119 in 118 (see chart).
- His RBI total was tied for the third-most in franchise history for a player in his first year with the club and the most since Phil Plantier had 100 RBI in his first season with the Friars in 1993.
- Kemp drove in 35 go-ahead RBI this season, tied with TOR Josh Donaldson for the highest total in Major League Baseball...his **35 go-ahead RBI in 2015 were tied for the third-most by a Padres player since full records started being kept in 1974, trailing only Fred McGriff's 37 in 1991 and Joe Carter's 36 in 1990**.
- During the second half of the season (since July 17), he hit .286/.339/.528 (71-for-248) with 13 doubles, one triple, 15 home runs and 53 RBI, tied for the third-most RBI in the NL (C. Gonzalez, 62 and Arenado, 60) and tied for the seventh-most home runs.

TOUR DE MATT: Matt Kemp hit for the first cycle in team history in the club's 7,444th all-time game on August 14 at Coors Field in Denver, Colorado...it was also Kemp's first career cycle, as he had fallen one hit shy of the cycle on five separate occasions, most recently on September 26, 2012 as a member of the Dodgers vs. the Padres (missed a triple).

- Kemp's cycle was the 309th in Major League history and the fourth of 2015 (BOS Brock Holt on June 16, TEX Shin-Soo Choo on July 21 and TEX Adrian Beltre on August 3)...prior to Kemp, the last NL player to hit for the cycle was COL Michael Cuddyer on August 17, 2014.
- Having sealed the cycle with a triple in his final at-bat, Kemp was the 51st player since full play-by-play data became available in 1974 to hit for the cycle with the triple coming as the final piece and the third player this season to have done it that way, joining Shin-Soo Choo and Brock Holt...the last NL player to have done this was Arizona's Aaron Hill on June 29, 2012.
- Prior to the cycle, the Padres had been one hit shy of the cycle on 361 occasions, with 258 times needing a triple.

WHO'S THE 'ROSS'?: Tyson Ross finished the 2015 campaign with new career-highs in innings pitched and strikeouts after he went 10-12 with a 3.26 ERA (71 ER, 196.0 IP) and 212 strikeouts against 84 walks while limiting the opposition to a .237 batting average.

- His strikeout total finished the season ranked 13th in the Majors, sixth in the National League and second on the team (Shields, 216).
- Ross' 212 strikeouts were a new career high, surpassing his previous best of 195 SO set in 2014...Ross was the second pitcher in franchise history to record 195+ strikeouts in consecutive seasons, joining Jake Peavy who did so in three straight seasons from 2005-07.
- He also posted a 9.73 strikeouts per nine innings ratio (212 strikeouts/196.0 IP), the second-best mark in franchise history by a starter, trailing only the 9.87 mark (189 SO/172.1 IP) set by Andy Benes during the 1994 season.
- Ross' 196.0 innings pitched in 2015 was one more inning than his previous record of 195.0 IP set in 2014...he was the first Padres pitcher since Jake Peavy from 2005-07 to record 195.0+ in consecutive seasons (Peavy did so in three straight seasons).
- Ross allowed just nine home runs in 196.0 IP, good for a 0.41 home runs per nine innings ratio, the third-best mark among qualified Major League starters, trailing only Jake Arrieta (0.39) and WSH Gio Gonzalez (0.41)...it was also the seventh-best mark in franchise history and the best since Kevin Brown had a 0.28 HR/9 (8 HR, 257.0 IP) during the 1998 season.
- Posted a 100.0-inning streak without allowing a home run from April 28 - July 29, the longest by a Major League pitcher in a single season (in terms of both starts and innings pitched) since Mets starter Sid Fernandez went 16 starts and 111.0 innings pitched during the 1992 season...was the third-longest in terms of innings pitched in franchise history, trailing only Dave Roberts (123.1 IP from 4/30-7/20 in 1971) and Padres Hall-of-Famer Randy Jones (107.1 IP from 7/3-9/11 in 1978).

SAN DIEGO PADRES 2015 SEASON REVIEW

MORE ON TYSON "BOSS": Ross recorded 212 strikeouts and allowed nine home runs in 2015 and recorded 195 strikeouts and allowed 13 home runs last season...since the start of the 2000 campaign, Ross is the fifth Major League pitcher to have consecutive seasons of 195+ strikeouts and less than 15 homers allowed (see chart).

- Of the 10 listed seasons in the chart, four of them earned Cy Young Awards (Kershaw 2013-14 & Lincecum 2008-09).

MAMA SAID PUNCH YOU OUT: The Padres pitching staff recorded 1,393 strikeouts in 2015, a new franchise record, surpassing the previous record of 1,295 held by the 2010 club.

- The Padres finished the season ranked fourth in the Majors and third in the NL in strikeouts, trailing only the Chicago Cubs (1,431), Cleveland Indians (1,407) and Los Angeles Dodgers (1,396).
- The Padres' starting rotation recorded a franchise-record 890 punch-outs, surpassing the previous team record of 828 set during the 1998 season...the starting rotation's strikeout total ranked sixth-most in the Majors and fourth in the National League.
- **The Friars' pitching staff recorded 57 games of 10+ strikeouts, the highest total in franchise history, surpassing the previous record of 50 done during the 2010 season.**

THE WHIFF: The Padres had four pitchers this season with 160+ strikeouts (Shields 216, Ross 212, Kennedy 174, Cashner 165), **marking the first time in franchise history they've had more than two pitchers eclipse the 160+ strikeout mark in a single season** (last Kennedy and Ross in 2014).

- San Diego was one of three Major League teams to have four pitchers with 160+ strikeouts this season, joining the Chicago Cubs (Arrieta, Hammel, Hendricks, Lester) and the Cleveland Indians (Bauer, Carrasco, Kluber, Salazar).
- Prior to the 2015 season, the last National League West team to have four players with 160+ strikeouts in a single season was the 1969 Houston Astros (Don Wilson 235, Larry Dierker 232, Tom Griffin 200 and Denny Lemaster 173).

DOSCIENTOS: Both James Shields (216) and Tyson Ross (212) recorded 200+ strikeouts in 2015, making them the seventh and eighth pitchers in franchise history, respectively, to reach the 200 strikeout plateau in a single season...**additionally, with the achievement, Shields and Ross are the first set of teammates in franchise history to record 200 punchouts in the same season.**

- Shields and Ross were one of five Major League duos to reach the 200 strikeout mark, joining the Chicago Cubs (Arrieta and Lester), the Cleveland Indians (Carrasco and Kluber), the Los Angeles Dodgers (Greinke and Kershaw) and Pittsburgh Pirates (Cole and Liriano).

BEING THE BULLDOG: James Shields threw 202.1 innings in 2015, making him the 69th pitcher in Padres franchise history to reach the 200.0+ innings pitched milestone and the first since Ian Kennedy threw 201.0 innings in 2014.

- Shields now has nine consecutive seasons with 200.0+ innings pitched, having reached the milestone every year since 2007...Shields is the only Major League pitcher with 200.0+ innings pitched each of the last nine seasons (Mark Buehrle had a 14 season streak of 200+ IP snapped this season).
- His nine seasons with 200.0 innings pitched are the second-most among all active Major League pitchers, behind only Mark Buehrle (14 seasons).
- Shields posted a 13-7 record and 3.91 ERA (88 ER, 202.1 IP) with 216 strikeouts against 81 walks while limiting the opposition to a .248 batting average over 33 starts... Shields started the 2015 season 7-0 through his first 14 starts of the season (until June 14th), a new career-best streak to start a season...he was just the second pitcher in Padres history to start a season 7-0, with the only other to do so being Andy Hawkins, who began the 1985 season a franchise-best 11-0 in his first 12 starts.

UPTO(W)N FUNK YOU UP: Justin Upton finished the 2015 season leading the Padres in both home runs (26) and stolen bases (19), making him one of three players in franchise history to finish a season as the team leader in both homers and thefts, joining Reggie Sanders in 1999 (26 home runs, 36 stolen bases) and Dave Winfield in 1976 (13 home runs, 26 stolen bases)...**Upton was the only player in Major League Baseball this season to lead his team in both home runs and stolen bases and the first Major Leaguer since MIN Brian Dozier, MIL Carlos Gomez and LAA Mike Trout all did in 2014.**

- Upton finished the season with a .251/.336/.454 (136-for-542) line with 26 doubles, 26 home runs, 81 RBI and 19 stolen bases in 150 games for San Diego... he was one of three Major League players with his combination of home runs and stolen bases, joining BAL Manny Machado (35 HR, 20 SB) and ARI Paul Goldschmidt (33 HR, 21 SB).
- Belted 15 home runs at Petco Park in 2015, tied with Will Venable in 2013 for the highest single-season total in ballpark history...all-time, owns a .282/.360/.519 (125-for-443) line with 25 home runs and 61 RBI in downtown San Diego, the fifth-best batting average, the third-best on-base percentage and second-best slugging percentage in ballpark history among active players with at least 150 at-bats at Petco Park.
- Among Padres players to have played at least 75% of their games in a single season in the outfield, Upton's 26 home runs this season were the seventh-most by an outfielder in team history and the most since Reggie Sanders also hit 26 homers during the 1999 season...even further, among Padres players to have played at least 75% of their games in a single season in left field, Upton's home run total is the third most in club history and the most since Greg Vaughn hit a team-record 50 home runs in 1998.
- Upton hit .343 with six home runs, 23 RBI and nine stolen bases during the month of May, joining Ryan Klesko as the only player in Padres franchise history to hit six or more homers and steal nine or more bases in a single month during the season (Klesko also did so in May of 2001).
- Justin Upton recorded his 600th career RBI with his single on August 21st, making him the 61st active player to reach that milestone...additionally, having reached the plateau at 27 years and 361 days old, he is one of seven active players to reach the 600 RBI mark before turning 28.

CINCINNATI KID: Upton made his third career All-Star Game appearance on July 14th in Cincinnati as he was named to the NL squad by Bruce Bochy as a manager's selection...he entered the game as a defensive replacement in right field in the seventh inning.

- Upton singled to left field off Kansas City's Wade Davis in his only plate appearance in the eighth inning and immediately stole second base...**Upton was the 13th different Padres player to get a hit in an All-Star Game (20th time) and first since Adrian Gonzalez did so in 2008.**
- Upton was the third player in franchise history, fourth time, to steal a base in an All-Star Game and the first since Tony Gwynn did so in 1989...Gwynn also stole a base in 1984 and Ozzie Smith stole a base in 1981.
- **Upton joined Tony Gwynn in 1984 and 1989 as the only players in Padres franchise history to have both a hit and a stolen base in an All-Star Game.**
- Upton was the 10th outfielder overall in Padres history to represent San Diego in the All-Star Game (also: **Tony Gwynn** – 15 time selection and once as honorary guest, **Dave Winfield** – four time selection for SD, **Cito Gaston, Johnny Grubb, Ruppert Jones, Steve Finley, Greg Vaughn and Rondell White**).

FEAR THE BEARD: Derek Norris posted a .250/.305/.404 (129-for-515) line with 33 doubles, two triples, 14 home runs and 62 RBI in 147 games for the Padres in 2015...among Major Leaguers with 75% or more of their games played as a catcher this season, Norris ranked first in doubles and extra-base hits, sixth in RBI, fourth in hits and ninth in home runs (see chart).

- In terms of franchise history, Norris' 33 doubles were tied for the second-most in franchise history (along with Benito Santiago in 1987) by a player to play 75% or more of their games behind the plate, trailing only Terry Kennedy's 42 in 1982.
- Norris' 49 extra-base hits this season were the third-most in franchise history by a player to have played 75% or more of their games as a backstop, trailing only Kennedy's 64 in 1982 and Santiago's 53 in 1987.
- Tallied 11 doubles against the Colorado Rockies this season, a new franchise record for most doubles by a player against a single opponent in a single season...additionally, including his two home runs vs. Colorado this season, Norris had 13 extra-base hits vs. the Rockies, tied for the third-most in franchise history vs. a single opponent in a single season and the most since Ryan Klesko had a franchise-record 16 against COL in 2002 (Gyorko and Kemp also had 13 vs. COL in 2015).
- Recorded 38 catcher caught stealings in 2015, the most by a Major League catcher since Gerald Laird caught 40 would-be basestealers in 2009 for the Tigers and the most by an NL catcher since Paul Lo Duca caught 43 would-be basestealers in 2003 for the Dodgers.
- **In terms of franchise history, Norris' CCS total ranks seventh-best and are the most since John Flaherty had 42 in 1997.**

WELCOME TO THE JUNGLE: Craig Kimbrel posted 39 saves in 43 opportunities, the fourth-most saves in the National League, trailing only PIT Mark Melancon (51), STL Trevor Rosenthal (48) and NYM Jeury's Familia (43)...also posted a 2.58 ERA (17 ER, 59.1 IP) as well as 87 strikeouts against 22 walks while holding the opposition to a .185 batting average.

- Among National League relievers, Kimbrel's 87 strikeouts were tied for the fourth-most, trailing only CIN Aroldis Chapman (116), MIL Will Smith (91) and STL Kevin Siegrist (90)...his .185 opponents batting average was seventh-best in the National League and 11th-best in the Majors.
- **Kimbrel posted a 13.20 strikeouts per nine innings ratio (87 SO/59.1 IP), the best mark in Padres franchise history by a relief pitcher.**
- Kimbrel secured his 200th career save on June 8 vs. Atlanta in what was his 318th career game...**with the save, Kimbrel became the quickest pitcher in Major League history to reach the 200 save plateau**, 41 games faster than Jonathan Papelbon, who was the previous record holder with 200 saves in 359 career games...he was the 47th player in Major League history to reach the milestone.
- Kimbrel, who turned 27 on May 28, is the second-youngest pitcher to ever record 200 saves, behind only Francisco Rodriguez, who reached 200 saves at 26 years and 239 days old...Huston Street is the next youngest pitcher to reach the 200 save plateau, having done so at 29 years and 52 days old.
- Recorded at least one strikeout in 21 consecutive games from May 2 - June 26, tied for the second-longest streak by a reliever in team history, trailing only the 26 game streak by Trevor Hoffman from July 14 - September 14, 1998.
- From May 25th until the end of the season, posted a 4-1 record and 28 saves with a 1.44 ERA (7 ER, 43.2 IP) and 64 strikeouts against 17 walks while limiting the opposition to a .155 batting average.

SAN DIEGO PADRES 2015 SEASON REVIEW

SAN DIEGO'S BEST "IPK": Over his final 22 starts of the season since the start of June, Ian Kennedy went 7-10 with a 3.41 ERA (49 ER, 129.1 IP) and 137 strikeouts against 38 walks while limiting opponents to a .248 (122-for-491) batting average...posted a 9.53 strikeouts per nine innings in that time, the seventh-best mark in the NL.

- Since the second half of the season began on July 17, Kennedy posted 98 strikeouts, tied for the fifth-highest total in the NL and tied for the 10th-most in the Majors...his 98 punch-outs following the break are tied for the fifth-most in franchise history after the "Mid-Summer Classic" (see chart).
- Over a 12-start stretch from June 13 - August 21, Kennedy allowed at least one home run in each start, allowing 14 total in that stretch...according to ELIAS, the streak is the longest ever by a Padre pitcher in a single season (previous nine-straight by Josh Geer in 2009 and Sterling Hitchcock in 1998).
- During that span he went 4-6 with a 2.63 ERA (21 ER, 72.0 IP) ... **per ELIAS, since earned runs were first recorded in both leagues, Kennedy is the only Major League pitcher to have allowed a home run in 11-or-more consecutive games and maintain an ERA less than 3.00 in that time...only one other pitcher has had a streak of at least 10 consecutive starts with a homer allowed while posting an ERA under 3.00 during the streak: Roger Clemens for the Boston Red Sox in 1986 (2.64 ERA in 10-straight from 4/11-6/1), the year he won both his first career Cy Young award and his first and only MVP award.**

HELL'S BELLS: The Padres posted a 62-0 record this season when leading after eight innings, one of two National League teams and one of three teams in the Majors to be undefeated when leading after the eighth inning joining the New York Yankees (81-0) and Washington Nationals (74-0).

- **Since the start of 2014, the Padres are 125-1 when leading after eight innings...**the club last lost when leading after eight innings on July 5 of last season when they dropped a 5-3 game to the Giants in 10 innings that they were leading 3-2 after eight... **the Padres have won 93 consecutive games when leading after eight innings, the longest such streak in the National League** (STATS, Inc).
- **Since the 2010 season, the Padres own a 396-10 record (.975) when leading after eight innings,** the best record in MLB in that time.

PETCO 500: With their 9-3 win on August 21 vs. St. Louis, **the Padres secured their 500th all-time win at Petco Park...**at season's end, the Padres own a 509-463 (.524) record in their downtown ballpark, which opened for the 2004 season.

- There have been eight Major League stadiums to open since the start of the 2004 season, including Petco Park (2004), Citizens Bank Park in Philadelphia (2004), Busch Stadium in St. Louis (2006), Nationals Park in Washington D.C. (2008), Citi Field in New York (2009), Yankee Stadium in New York (2009), Target Field in Minneapolis (2010) and Marlins Park in Miami (2012)...of those eight stadiums, the Padres were second of that group to reach 500 wins in their home ballpark, trailing only the Phillies at Citizens Bank Park (532).

COME ONE, COME ALL: The Padres recorded 11 sellouts at Petco Park in 2015, the fourth time in the downtown ballpark's 12-year history of 10-or-more sellouts (2004, 2005, 2007)...the 11 sellouts were the most at Petco Park since selling out 16 games during the 2007 season.

- Four of the top nine attendances in Petco Park history and five of the top 11 happened during the 2015 season (see chart).
- Over the course of a four-game series with the Giants from April 9-12, **the Padres drew 168,171 fans in attendance, the highest-attended series in ballpark history...**the previous record was 164,395, set in a four-game set from July 14-17, 2005 vs. Arizona.

EVERYTHING IS ALL RIGHT: The Padres used a right-handed starting pitcher in 158 of their 162 games in 2015, including a stretch of 148 consecutive games to start the season...the 148 game streak of starting a right-handed pitcher is the longest streak in franchise history, surpassing the previous record of 133 straight games from April 7 - September 2, 2006.

- LHP Robbie Erlin started and ended the streak for the Padres, having made the start in the final game of the 2014 season on September 28 at San Francisco and making his first start of the 2015 season on September 19 at Colorado.
- Erlin made three starts for the Padres (9/19 at COL, 9/26 vs. ARI and 10/3 at LAD) and LHP Frank Garces made the start in the season finale on October 4th at LAD

ENSHRINED IN THE PADRES HALL OF FAME: On August 7th, the Padres honored Benito Santiago and Garry Templeton as they were inducted into the Padres Hall of Fame during a special pregame, on-field ceremony... the election was made in conjunction with the San Diego chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America (BBWAA), local sports media and the San Diego Padres front office... **Santiago and Templeton are the 10th and 11th members to be inducted into the Padres Hall of Fame, joining Buzze Bavasi, Nate Colbert, Jerry Coleman, Tony Gwynn, Trevor Hoffman, Randy Jones, Ray Kroc, Dick Williams and Dave Winfield.**

- Santiago was the first catcher inducted into the Padres Hall of Fame...the backstop made his Major League debut for San Diego in 1986 and was unanimously named National League Rookie of the Year in 1987, the first in franchise history.
- A five-time National League All-Star, four with the Padres (1989-92), Santiago played seven of his first 20 Major League seasons for San Diego, hitting .264 for San Diego with 124 doubles, 15 triples, 85 home runs and 375 RBI over 789 games from 1986-92...the Puerto Rico native also received four Louisville Silver Slugger Awards (1987-88, 1990-91) and three Rawlings Gold Gloves (1988-90) in his career, all with San Diego. ... **his career-best and franchise-record 34-game hitting streak during his rookie season in 1987 still stands as the longest hitting streak in Major League history by a rookie as well as the longest ever by a catcher.**
- Santiago ranks among catching leaders in franchise history in the majority of offensive categories, including first in home runs, triples and runs scored (308), second in RBI, games, hits, doubles and at-bats and third in walks (137)...his four starts behind the plate for the National League All-Star team are the second-most starting nods at the Mid-Summer Classic in franchise history behind only Tony Gwynn and his 12 starts...his three Gold Glove Awards and four Silver Slugger Awards are also the second-most in franchise history behind only Gwynn (five Gold Gloves, seven Silver Sluggers).
- Templeton, who played 10 of his 16 Major League seasons with San Diego from 1982-1991, was the first shortstop inducted into the Padres Hall of Fame...the switch-hitter hit .252 with 195 doubles, 36 triples, 43 home runs and 427 RBI over 1,286 games for the Padres.
- Templeton ranks second to Tony Gwynn among franchise leaders in several offensive categories, including games played, at-bats, hits and doubles and ranks fourth in triples, seventh in RBI and eighth in runs scored...he was named a National League All-Star for the Padres and team MVP in 1985 and earned a Louisville Silver Slugger Award in 1984...over his 10 seasons in San Diego, he posted a .965 fielding percentage at shortstop, the best fielding percentage in franchise history by a shortstop.

OH MY!: Padres and Fox Sports San Diego play-by-play man Dick Enberg was the recipient of the 2015 Ford C. Frick Award from the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum for excellence in broadcasting.

- Enberg was with the award during the National Baseball Hall of Fame's Hall-of-Fame weekend on July 25 and is now one of two individuals to have earned recognition with each of the Baseball, Football (Rozelle Award) and Basketball Halls of Fame (Gowdy Award) (Curt Gowdy also did so).
- Enberg also has been inducted into the National Sports Broadcasting Hall of Fame and the National Sportscaster and Sportswriters Hall of Fame as well as the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.
- Enberg announced in September that he will retire following the 2016 season.

MILES AND MILES OF HEART: The Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association (MLBPAA) named Derek Norris the Padres recipient of the 2015 Heart & Hustle Award... the award honors active players who demonstrate a passion for the game of baseball and best embody the values, spirit and tradition of the game. The Heart & Hustle Award is also the only award in Major League Baseball that is voted on by former players.

- The MLBPAA formed 30 committees, comprised of Alumni players with established relationships to each team...as the season draws to a close, fans, all Alumni and active players will vote to select the final winner from the 30 team winners.
- The final winner will be announced Nov. 10, 2015, at the 16th Annual Legends for Youth Dinner in New York City...this event is the primary fundraiser for the series of free Legends for Youth baseball clinics...these clinics impact more than 15,000 children each year at 120 clinics, allowing them the unique opportunity to interact with and learn from players who have left a lasting impact on the game of baseball.

WEATHER REPORT: The Padres experienced their first home game postponement since the 2006 season on July 19 vs. Colorado after the game was postponed due to playing conditions and continued inclement weather in the forecast...the game was later played on September 10th...the Friars also had a rain delay at Petco Park on May 14th vs. Washington (1 hour, 56 minutes), the first at Petco Park since April 8, 2011.

- **July 19th's rainout was just the second in Petco Park history and the first since April 4, 2006, a span of 820 games (nine years, three months and 15 days or 3,393 days).**
- Overall, the postponement was the 17th rainout in San Diego's history and just the third since the 1990 season (April 4, 2006, and May 12, 1998)... **it was the first rain incident (postponement/suspension/delay) during the month of July in San Diego's baseball history.**
- The delay, due to the postponement, is not an official rain delay...however, the delay did last two hours and thirty minutes before it was postponed and would have been the second official rain delay at Petco Park this season (May 14 vs. Washington).
- There were 25 games at Petco Park between the two rain incidents at Petco Park this season...prior to this short stretch, there had been 337 games between rain delays in downtown San Diego.

SO HOT IN SO CAL: September 10th's first pitch temperature at Petco Park of 93 degrees was the warmest in ballpark history and the hottest game played in San Diego since another 93 degree day on August 30, 1998 at Qualcomm Stadium.

- September 9th's game against Colorado was 89 degrees, the warmest night game temperature in Petco Park history.

SAN DIEGO PADRES 2015 SEASON REVIEW

WALK IT OFF: The Padres recorded four walk-off victories this season, three of which occurred during the month of September...Derek Norris recorded a game-ending grand slam on May 29 vs. Pittsburgh, Brett Wallace logged a walk-off fielder's choice on September 8 vs. Colorado, Jedd Gyorko had a game-ending single on September 23 vs. San Francisco and Alexi Amarista had a walk-off single on September 24 vs. San Francisco.

- Since Petco Park opened in 2004, the Padres have recorded 99 walk-off wins, tied for the second-highest total in baseball in that time, trailing only the Oakland Athletics, who have won in walk-off fashion 104 times in that span.

THE SALAMI IS GRAND: Derek Norris tallied a career-high and a Padres season-high five hits in five plate appearances on July 30 at New York, logging four singles and a grand slam in the seventh inning...Norris was the first player in Padres franchise history to record five hits and a grand slam in a single game, the first Major Leaguer to do so since NYY Russell Martin on August 25, 2011 at OAK and the first NL player to do so since SF Tsuyoshi Shinjo on July 2, 2002 at Colorado.

- Before Norris, the only other Major League players over the last 40 seasons to go 5-for-5 or better with a grand slam were Steve Garvey (1977), Toby Harrah (1986), Carlos Delgado (1998), Torii Hunter (2005) and Russell Martin (2011)...**prior to Norris, the last NL player to go 5-for-5 or better with a grand slam was Steve Garvey on August 28, 1977 vs. STL** (STATS, Inc).
- The slam was the Padres' fifth of the season, their highest total since also hitting five during the 2010 season...five grand slams ranks tied as the second-highest total in the National League, trailing only the Giants, who led the Majors with nine home runs with the bases loaded.

THE 'GRAND' FINALE: Derek Norris belted a two-out, walk-off grand slam in the ninth inning on May 29 vs. Pittsburgh, the Friars first walk-off victory of the season...it was the sixth walk-off grand slam in Padres franchise history and the first since Adrian Gonzalez hit an opposite field walk-off slam against the Mets in the 11th inning on June 2, 2010... other players to accomplish this feat were Everth Cabrera on August 7, 2009, Rondell White on June 20, 2003, Steve Finley on April 10, 1998 and Bip Roberts on May 20, 1995.

- **Having also struck out four times in the contest, Derek Norris was the first player in Major League history to strike out four times in a game before hitting a walk-off grand slam**...prior to Norris, the last player to strike out four or more times and hit a grand slam in the same game was Mark Teixeira on May 25, 2003.
- Norris was the first catcher to hit a walk off grand slam since Jeff Mathis hit a walk-off grand slam for the Marlins on June 30, 2013 vs. the Padres.

GO DEEPI: As a team, the Padres hit 148 home runs in 2015, their fourth-highest total during the Petco Park era (since 2004) and their most since hitting 154 home runs during the 2008 season...having only hit 109 home runs a season ago, the +39 home run differential from last year to this year is the fourth-largest difference in home runs from one year to the next in franchise history (see chart).

- The Padres hit 74 home runs at Petco Park this season, one shy of the franchise record for most homers hit by the Friars at Petco Park in a single season... the franchise record for most homers hit by the Padres at Petco Park is 75 in 2006.
- During the 2014 season, Padres outfielders combined to hit .234 with 126 extra-base hits, 29 home runs, 141 RBI and 183 runs scored...**during the 2015 season, Padres outfielders combined to hit .252 with 166 extra-base hits, 63 home runs, 257 RBI and 256 runs scored.**

HOME ON THE RANGE: Over his last 30 starts at Petco Park since June 23, 2013, Andrew Cashner has posted a 8-14 record despite a 2.43 ERA (54 ER, 200.1 IP) and 177 strikeouts against 44 walks while limiting the opposition to a .234 batting average, allowing two or fewer earned runs 24 times and three or fewer 27 times.

- **Posted a streak of 21 consecutive home starts allowing two or fewer earned runs from June 11, 2013 - April 29, 2015, a Major League record.**
- His home ERA since June 23, 2013 ranks sixth-best among Major League starters with at least 150.0 IP in their home ballpark, trailing only Clayton Kershaw (1.66), Jacob deGrom (1.87), Zack Greinke (1.99), Jake Arrieta (2.01) and Johnny Cueto (2.19).

WHAT A DEBUT: Travis Jankowski made his Major League debut for the Padres on August 21, getting the start in center field, batting ninth, going 2-for-4 with a RBI and a run scored...notched his first career Major League hit in his first career plate appearance off John Lackey, making him the 32nd player in Padres franchise history to record a hit in his first career Major League plate appearance.

- After he logged a hit in his second at-bat, he was the third player in franchise history to record a hit in each of his first two career plate appearances of his first career game, joining Wiki Gonzalez on August 14, 1999 and John Sipin on May 24, 1969.
- Having recorded hits in each of his first two plate appearances, he's the seventh player in Padres franchise history to record hits in each of his first two career plate appearances, regardless of game number...Jake Goebbert was the last Padres player to accomplish this, having recorded a pinch-hit single on June 20, 2014 and then a single in his first at-bat the following day on June 21.
- Jankowski was the ninth player in franchise history to record 2+ hits in his Major League debut and the first since Sean Burroughs did so on April 2, 2002...the only two players to have 3+ hits in his MLB debut was Wiki Gonzalez on August 14, 1999 and Barry Evans on September 4, 1978.
- He was the 23rd player in franchise history with an RBI in his Major League debut and the first since Cory Spangenberg drove in a pair of runs in his debut on September 1, 2014...**he is the fourth player in franchise history with 2+ hits and 1+ RBI in his big league debut, joining Barry Evans on September 4, 1978 (3 H, 1 RBI), Juan Bonilla on April 9, 1981 (2 H, 1 RBI) and Tony Gwynn on July 19, 1982 (2 H, 1 RBI).**
- Since 1914, Jankowski was the third National League non-pitcher ever to make his Major League debut as a starter in the nine-hole vs. another National League opponent, joining CHC Addison Russell who made his Major League debut hitting ninth for the Cubs on April 21 at Pittsburgh and STL Mark Little, who hit ninth on September 12, 1998 at Houston.

TURN UP FOR SPRING: In April, Major League Baseball announced they set a new Spring Training attendance record with 4,034,708 fans attending games over 481 dates for an average of 8,388 per game... the 2015 total eclipsed the previous record of 3,823,479 set in 2013, while the average attendance of 8,388 eclipsed the previous best of 8,078 in 2014.

- In 15 home games at the Peoria Sports Complex this spring, the San Diego Padres drew 106,368 fans, surpassing their mark of 76,096 over 14 home games in 2014...combined with complex-mates the Seattle Mariners, the Peoria Sports Complex drew a total of 238,847 fans this spring, a new record for the ballpark, surpassing the previous best of 230,662 in 2002.

- Held right-handed hitters to a .144/.250/.221 (15-for-104) line, the lowest opponents batting average and third-lowest opponents slugging percentage of any NL pitcher to have faced 100+ right-handed hitters...among Padres pitchers to have faced at least 100 right-handed hitters in a single season, Benoit's .144 opponents batting average is third-best in team history (Cla Meredith, 2006, .107; Heath Bell, 2009, .138) and his .221 opponents slugging percentage is fifth-best (Meredith, 2006, .170; Bell, 2009, .172; Luke Gregerson, 2009, 203).
- Held right-handed hitters hitless for 41 consecutive at-bats from May 3 - July 2, the longest such streak by a Major League pitcher during the 2015 season and the longest such streak by a Padres pitcher since full play-by-play data started being recorded during the 1974 season. (STATS, Inc).
- Pitched to an 0-1 record with a 2.28 ERA (7 ER, 27.2 IP) and 30 strikeouts against eight walks while limiting the opposition to a .173 batting average in 28 games during the second half of the season...this compared to a 6-4 record with a 2.39 ERA (10 ER, 37.2 IP) and 33 strikeouts against 15 walks and a .148 opponents batting average in 39 games during the first half of the season.
- Posted a 3-3 record with a 1.67 ERA (6 ER, 32.1 IP) and .143 opponents batting average in 33 road appearances in 2015, the eighth-lowest road ERA and the lowest opponents batting average of any NL pitcher with at least 25.0 IP away from their home ballpark...under this same criteria, his opponents batting average on the road is the second-best in franchise history, behind only Doug Bochtler's .124 mark during the 1996 season.

- Set a career-high with 12 strikeouts in his outing on June 1 vs. New York-NL despite pitching just 4.2 innings...dating back to 1914, Cashner was one of two pitchers to ever strikeout 12-or-more batters in an outing of less than 5.0 innings pitched, joining TB Alex Cobb, who struck out 13 in 4.2 innings pitched against the Padres on May 10, 2013 at Tropicana Field.
- Cashner started the season 2-7 with a 3.00 ERA (21 ER, 63.0 IP) over his first 10 starts of the season (through May 30th)...dating back to the 1940 season, Cashner was one of eight Major League pitchers to have seven or more losses with an ERA of 3.00 or better through his first 10 starts of a season **and the first since Mets starter Jim McAndrew started the 1968 season 3-7 with a 2.17 ERA.**
- Posted a 3-8 record with a 3.86 ERA (36 ER, 84.0 IP) in 14 games, all starts, at Petco Park in 2015...this compared to a 3-8 record with a 4.74 ERA (53 ER, 100.2 IP) in 17 games, all starts, on the road.
- His 17 games started on the road were tied for the third-most in the National League in 2015 while his 100.2 IP ranked 12th.

- During the second half, posted 98 strikeouts, tied for the fifth-highest total in the NL and tied for the 10th-most in the Majors...his 98 punch-outs following the break are tied for the fifth-most in franchise history after the "Mid-Summer Classic."

- Shields' season was the third 200+ strikeout campaign of his career, joining his 2011 (225) and 2012 seasons (223).
- Posted 126 strikeouts in 19 starts before the All-Star Break, the third-most in franchise history by a Padres pitcher during the first half trailing only the 138 strikeouts by Andy Benes in 1994 and the 133 strikeouts by Ian Kennedy in 2014.

- Among pitchers to change teams during the 2014-15 offseason, Shields' 13 wins in 2015 were tied for the fourth-most in baseball, trailing only ARI Rubby De La Rosa (14), NYY Nathan Eovaldi (14) and WSH Max Scherzer (14).
- Shields reached 100 strikeouts in 82.2 innings pitched, the fastest a starter has ever reached 100 strikeouts in franchise history,** surpassing the previous record of 90.0 IP by Cory Luebke in 2011 and Sterling Hitchcock in 1999...he was the third-fastest pitcher (starter or reliever) in franchise history to reach 100 strikeouts, trailing only Trevor Hoffman, who got to 100 SO in 71.2 IP in 1997 and 80.2 IP in 1996.

- In his first year as a Padre led the club in hits (158), games played (154) and RBI (100), his most games played, most hits and most RBI since having a career-high 195 hits and 126 RBI in 2011, the third 100-RBI campaign of his career (also 101 RBI in 2009).
- Became the 14th different Padre in team history to collect 100 RBI in a season (19th time overall) and the first to do so since Chase Headley had a National League leading 115 RBI in 2012.

- In his first year as a Padre was named to his third career National League All-Star squad (also, 2009 and 2011), representing the Padres in Cincinnati for the 86th All-Star Game.
- Played in 150 games total in 2015, making 146 starts with 145 in left field and one as the designated hitter.
